

SAM JORDAN WILL SPEAK HERE SOON

Earnest Apostle of Better Farming Will Lecture Before Farmers' Convention

Sam Jordan, an earnest apostle of better farming methods, and at this time the highest priced farm demonstration agent in the United States, has been secured to deliver a lecture at the Farmers' and Farm Women's Convention which meets at the State College, West Raleigh, August 27, 28 and 29. He has announced as the subject of his lecture at this time "The Crimson Trail of a New Idea," which deals with the valuable things that at first have always been rejected by the people. This is a popular type of lecture, yet one that drives home the truths of agricultural progress, and is aptly suited to such an audience as annually visits the college to learn new ideas of agricultural work.

Sam Jordan was born in a log cabin in Gentry county, Missouri, about 53 years ago. His first work was that of teacher in the city schools, but when his health broke down he began farming—furnishing unlimited amusement for the whole country-side. He was a broken down farmer on a broken down farm, but soon his new ideas about the farming game began to furnish material for thought, rather than for laughter, and it was not long before he quit his eighty-acre farm to show the State how to run an 8,000,000-acre farm. He became known as "Sam Jordan, The Corn Man," went with the State Board of Agriculture, and later, as a result of the value of his state-wide lectures on better farming, was called to Pettie county as farm adviser. Here he gave up the title of Professor Jordan, acquired during his lecture days, and again became plain "Sam Jordan, Farmer."

He has been eminently successful in his work. Many lectures have been given by him on agricultural subjects all over the Middle West and those Chautauque circuits which have been so fortunate as to secure him state that, after giving him ten minutes on the platform, a reward can be offered to anyone who leaves the audience. This reward has never been claimed, because Sam is irreplaceable.

According to Mr. W. F. Pate, secretary of the convention, Mr. Jordan will probably speak on Thursday. Every farmer in the State who can possibly make the trip should arrange to attend the convention on that day. Mr. Jordan is not the only speaker of prominence, however, nor will lectures fill the entire program. Demonstrations of all

kinds, round table conferences, social entertainment, and other valuable features will be offered all visitors, so that this will be a farmer's week worth remembering.

LYNCH DIES OF INJURIES SUSTAINED LAST APRIL

Was in Semi-Conscious Condition at His Home; Well Known in Raleigh

King Lynch, the colored man run over by Swift & Company's truck last April 29, on the corner of Salisbury and Martin, died of his injuries last night at 5:30, at his home at 703 Church street. Following his injury, he was in St. Agnes Hospital one month and afterwards was taken home, where he has since remained in a semi-conscious condition.

Lynch was a well known colored man, and was for 30 years janitor for Edwards & Broughton Printing Company. He was a deacon in St. Paul's Methodist Church for many years, from which the funeral services will be held tomorrow evening at 5 o'clock.

SIX BOUND TO COURT ON DISTILLING CHARGE
