ROCKY MOUNT MAN WEDS FRENCH YOUNG WOMAN

Rocky Mount, Aug. 1.—A cablegram was received here today by relatives announcing the marriage of Capt. W. Herbert Parker, of this city, to Mlle. Odette Maurice, of Paris, on July 22, 1919, at her home in the French capital.

The groom is the son of Mrs. George L. Parker and has a large number of friends in the city.

Captain Parker entered the service at the beginning of the war as a private and won a promotion to a captaincy after having gone to France as a member of the famous Rainbow division.

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His work necessitated his being in Paris a large portion of the time, and it was while engaged in his duties there that he met Mlle. Maurice who was serving the French and allied cause as an interpreter since she was proficient in both languages. The bride is the only child of a French father and an English mother.

Capt. and Mrs. Parker expect to sail about the first of August, and upon their arrival in this country will visit friends and relatives in this city before going to Pennsylvania where Captain Parker will resume his pre-war position with the Westinghouse Electric Company.

CHICAGO NEGROES HUNGER FOR SOUTH

Newspaper Asks Gov. Bickett How Many Negroes North Carolina Can Absorb

The fact that negroes in Chicago who went there from the South want to return, following race riots in that city, was revealed in a telegram from the Chicago Herald and Examiner to Governor Bickett yesterday.

The telegram follows: "Many negroes who came here for war work are anxious to return South if the South needs them. Their spokesmen ask us to inquire how many your State can absorb. They are of the more industrious class, distinct from the bad element responsible for the difficulties here. Please Rush Answer at our expense. (Signed) Chicago Herald and Examiner."

CHAMBER COMMITTEE AT RHAMKATTE CAPITAL

Raleigh Needs Better Cotton Market, Ex-Commissioner Franklin Says

Stevens Store, the capital of Rhamkatt, was the objective last night of the "Know Your Neighbor" committee from the Raleigh Chamber of Commerce, and it came back with a request from the Rhamkatt folk that Raleigh provide the farmers a better cotton and a better tobacco market.

B. S. Franklin, ex-chairman of the board of county commissioners, was one of the speakers, addressing himself to the market question after Mr. C. C. Kirkpatrick, the campaign director, had made a plea for more live stock and better live stock. Mr. Franklin said that Raleigh hadn't been doing all it should for the country folk and the country folk hadn't been doing all they could for Raleigh. He regarded the "Know Your Neighbor" plan the proper way to better conditions.

Accompanying Mr. Kirkpatrick last night were M. R. Beaman, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and J. M. Templeton, Jr. Among the prominent Rhamkatters in the talk-over meeting, besides Mr. Franklin, were Professor McLarty, M. E. Sherwin, Falk Mooneyhan, T. A. Stephens, T. J. Caudle, John Franklin, George Ford.
