

### CITED BY BRITISH FOR HIS BRAVERY

#### Franklinston Physician Receives Highest Honor For Bravery In Battle

Franklinston, Aug. 4.—The many friends here and throughout this section of the State, where he is so popular, will be interested in knowing that Dr. A. R. Winston, of this place, but who is at present with the army of occupation in Europe, was cited for D. S. O., by Great Britain, recently. This is considered the highest honor that could have been conferred upon an American soldier by the English government, and in order for him to wear the decoration it is necessary for the United States government to grant its permission, and this has been done and the information that Major Winston, has thus been honored comes through the Washington government, he being too modest to even mention the fact to his friends. The citation is as follows:

"During service with the 120th infantry his conduct has been very meritorious. During the time the regiment was holding Ypres salient from the 18th of August to the 4th of September, 1918, he constantly visited his aide posts, One Dollis' House at times when the station and the approaches were under terrific shell fire, his work in this salient earned the work points and perfected the medical organization of this regiment."

"At Bellecourt, 29th of September, 1918, shortly after the troops went over the top, he went forward, organized stretcher-bearers, made reconnaissance of the forward area and directed the clearing of wounded all under shell fire, as a result of wounded were cared for much sooner than would have been otherwise possible. In succeeding operations his work showed the same unselfish devotion to duty. From Ypres to Cattillon all the work of this officer has been particularly worthy of mention."

While a single performance of his duty would have been covered by a visit to his aide post at selected time, involved but slight personal risk, such was not the case. His aide post was visited constantly when roads and areas were subjected to the heaviest of shelling, with reckless disregard for his own life. In all operations of this regiment he has worked without consideration of himself. To this officer's untiring efforts and to his efficient organization is attributed the rapid and satisfying clearing of wounded and the resulting saving of lives and the elimination of unnecessary prolonged suffering. His work in back areas, equally important, has been with the constant aim of health and comfort of men."

Major Winston was born and reared here, and after receiving license to practice medicine located here and enjoyed a large practice, and was popular with all classes of people. He is expected to return to the States soon and the people of this place hope that he will again locate here for the practice of his profession.

### SLAYER OF OFFICER IS CAPTURED IN IREDELL

(Special to the News and Observer.) Statesville, Aug. 4.—Ralph Connor, the negro slayer of Deputy Sheriff Lloyd C. Cloninger, of Mooresville, this county, was caught at 11 o'clock today by a sheriff's posse after an all night search. Mr. Cloninger died last night at a local hospital of wounds received in battle with lawless negroes at a camp meeting grounds. Two other brothers of Ralph Sinclair and Johnson Connor were brought here last night and after an examination of wounds were locked up in jail.

The sheriff's posse with Ralph Connor reached here shortly after noon. Feeling is running very high against the culprits. Sheriff M. P. Alexander and deputies at 1 o'clock spirited the alleged murderers away, taking them to Winston-Salem for safe-keeping.

This is the second deputy sheriff to be killed by lawless negroes in this county within one year.

### BRAGG LAND CASE CONTINUED MONTH

#### Recent Act of Congress Makes Future Prosecution of Case Improbable

Continuance was taken by the government in the condemnation cases against Camp Bragg property in Hoke and Cumberland counties, yesterday morning in Federal District Court, because of an act of Congress approved July 11. The case directly affects some 640 individual property holders. When the case was called in court, District Attorney Thomas D. Warren announced that the continuance would be taken, and read the rider to the support of army bill which prevents further prosecution for the time being, as follows:

"That no part of any of the appropriations made hereinafter for the unexpended balances of appropriations heretofore made for the support and maintenance of the army or the military establishment shall be expended for the construction of army camps or encampments except in such cases as National army or National guard camps or encampments which were in use prior to November 11, 1918, where it has been or may be found more economical to the government for the purpose of salvaging such camps or encampments to buy real estate than to continue to pay rentals or claims for damages thereon, and except where industrial plants have been constructed or taken over by the government for war purposes and the purchase of land is necessary in order to protect the interest of the government."

Camp Bragg was not definitely established until after November 11th, so it falls under this ruling. The case will be called again on the first Monday in September.

In addition, Judge H. G. Connor yesterday allowed a continuance in the case of Alexander Sprunt and Sons against the alien enemy custodian for recovery of certain moneys on deposit in Germany, in banks and with cotton merchants. The amount named is \$975,000. The continuance was granted of the defense, to allow time for the filing of an answer.

### HIGH POINT WORKERS ARE OUT ON STRIKE

(Special to the News and Observer.) High Point, Aug. 4.—The great unrest among labor has reached a climax here with the coming of labor leaders and the formation of labor unions recently. This morning 130 men left their jobs in mills here and are now walking the streets. The idle workers in glass factories, Tomlinson Chair Manufacturing Company, Gant Furniture Company, Southern Mirror Company, Piedmont Hosiery Mills and other plants. The strikers claim that union men were discharged without cause. The action followed a meeting of the carpenters' and joiners' union Saturday night, which was addressed by Scott Kizer, of Indiana. Printed circulars were distributed today advertising a union speaking tonight, which was addressed by Marvin Hitch, of Charlotte, and J. H. Graham, and more strikers are expected to take action. The officials of the local plants affected are not talking.
