

My breakfast was cold bread and but-ter with a little bowl of coffee. The other meals I had at the company kitchen with the officers. When I left La Milesse the village people crowded around the machine, handing me beau-tiful flowers and saying an revol-1 I really was touched by their friendly attitude and kingloss, especially the last day I was i the village, for, when they learned I was leaving, they began coming entry in the morning to bring me flowers, cherrics, milk, etc., and to extend their good wishes. I was probably the only American woman they had ever seen, so you can inagine I was something of a curosity to them. The last flunday evening we were there the General gave a farewell party at the General gave a farewell party at his chateau at Lavardia, to which all the "Y" woem nin the area and the commanding officers were invited. It

commanding onicers were invited. It was a garden party and we had vaude-ville entertainers from Le Mans, foi-lowed by Charlie Chaplis in "Shoulder Arms." I have never seen a crowd of men enjoy a picture more. It seemed such a foreible reminder of their own their work overseas and are awaiting their work overseas and are awaiting sailing orders for Brest, my thoughts are turning homeward, and I want to tell you something of the "Y" ac-tivities in France, or, rather, some-thing of my own personal experience as a "Y" worker, which has been so wonderful and happy; so intensely in-teresting from beginning to end, that I feel more thankful each day I was selected for overseas service. After experiences and fortunately they could

see the funny side now. After the Lovisida sailed for home I reported to the Le Mars, and was assigned to the Belgian camp, about 10 kilometers out. This is a very large camp, with both white and colored troops, and the "Y" had several buts in the camp. It was a most interesting place to work and I enjoyed being there the last month. A Boston girl and myself were at the Indiana hut, and we had movies and dances for the boys, and served cold drinks every afternoon and evening. About twice a week we served ice cream, and it was like a childrens' party to see those boys, lined up with tin sups in hand just elamoring for it. We would write on the bulletin board outside: "Ice Cream Tonight," and that was suffcient. They came by the hundreds, and usually got in line for "seconds." Everything we served the last four months was free. It was all welfare work. Le Mans is the American embarkation centre, and there are a number of camps near the city. The inter-allied rifle and pistol contest was held while I was at the Belgian camp, and men from all the countries took part. General Pershing was there at the open-ing, and I had the pleasure of meet-ing him and taking his pleture. I went out on the rifle range with a friend, and the General came over to shake hands with the ladies, and when he saw I had my kodak, he most grac-

iously posed for a pieture. The work is all clearing out now, as The work is all clearing out how, as the boys are going home rapidly and the "Y" is closing many of its huts. I feel that it has done a splendid part by the boys, both here and in Eng-land, one of the biggest features in my opinion, being the entartainment it has brought to our soldiers and
