NEW STATE DIRECTOR FOR ARMENIAN RELIEF

Mr. Claude Hopper, who has been engaged in Armenian and Syrian relief campaign work in Georgia and South Carolina, has arrived in Raleigh to assume the State directorship. Mr. Hopper will open an office probably in the Masonic Temple.

Already the organization in the State for a permanent work has been begun by Ralph Runyan, who has been the State director up to this time. Mr. Runyan goes to Tennessee, his home State, to organize for the American committee in the same work. He has been in Raleigh for the past seven months.

Mr. Hopper is a returned soldier and is deeply interested in the work of re-

lief in the Near East.

It is hoped that the entire United States will be sufficiently organized to report at a conference which is to be held in New York August 29-30 and September 1-3. At that time all the State directors and as many State chairmen as possible will be at headquarters, when the entire plan of permanent campaign will be discussed.

Former President Pursued.—Kingston, Jamaica, Aug. 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Federico Tinoco, who recently abandoned the presidency of Costa Rica and fled the country, arrived here today on board the steamer Zacaipa, en route to Europe. He said several attempts had been made to assassinate him and that his brother, Jose, minister of war, was shot in the back of the head the night before the president left and died later.

Two Killed in Airplane Fall.—Paducah, Ky., Aug. 15.—Lieut. James D. Stewart, of Park Field, Memphis, and S. Reed Campbell, reporter, employed by the Commercial-Appel, were killed when the army airplane in which they were giving exhibition flights fell near the Country Club here tonight at 7:30. The pilot was attempting to make a third loop when he lost control of the machine. Both bodies were horribly battered.
