

RALEIGH SHRINERS REVIVE CLUB HERE

Dr. C. O. Abernethy is Elected President and Promises a Peppery Organization

MEMBERSHIP OF CLUB WILL BE EXTENDED

Fully Seventy-Five Nobles of Raleigh Will Attend Labor Day Ceremonial of Sudan Temple at Wrightsville; Board of Directors Will Determine Means of Transportation

The Raleigh Shrine Club, which has been in a quiescent condition for many months, came to life last night in a meeting of Raleigh Nobles at the Bland Hotel, where, in the midst of sandwiches, imitation staff and smokes, officers were elected and plans set in motion for a live, peppery organization.

"We want a man for the president of this club without a particle of dignity," said Noble W. R. Smith, and he put in nomination Dr. C. O. Abernethy. He was elected unanimously, and thereafter other officers were chosen as follows:

A. M. Maupis, vice-president; Thad Scarlett, treasurer; R. T. Gowan, secretary; H. S. Store, chairman of the board of directors, and W. R. Smith, J. G. Allen, Charles Farmer and Harry Browder, directors.

Plans for the reorganization of the Raleigh Shrine Club were started with the election of all the Shriners of Wake county to membership. The dues of the club, it was the sense of the meeting, will be reduced to a nominal sum and the organization will undertake various functions on a cooperative basis. This, however, was only discussed last night, and a committee of three, Nobles Storr, Browder and Smith was appointed to consider the by-laws and report on revision.

Fully seventy-five Shriners from Raleigh, it was stated last night, will go to Wilmington to attend the ceremonial session of the Sudan Temple, September 1. How the body will go and arrangements looking toward the trip were left to the board of directors.

SIXTY GALLON STILL RIDES AUTO TO TOWN

Officers Destroy Beer and Whiskey On Farm of Major Johnson, Colored

People on Fayetteville street yesterday enjoyed and pitied, according to the variety of temperaments, the sight of a seventy-gallon copper still riding conspicuously on the front of an automobile containing revenue officers. The still was captured four miles north of Wendell yesterday morning by Deputies Richardson and Raines.

The officers found fifty gallons of beer and a small quantity of whiskey which had been distilled. The beer and the spirits, in conformity to the law, were properly poured out and the still will, ere long, find its way to the junk pile.

The still was located on the farm of Major Johnson, colored, and while no arrests were made, the officers said that a son of Johnson's would be arrested on the charge of manufacturing whiskey.

Friday, Deputy Raines, with Deputy Marshals Dixon and Flowers, found two stills near Four Oaks, Johnston county, one of 25-gallon capacity and the other 60. No arrests were made and only a small quantity of beer found.

NAVY RECRUITING IS STILL GOING GOOD

Month Ending Last Thursday Was Record For Enlistments Since Armistice

Twenty-nine new recruits were added to the navy in this district during the past week, according to Lieutenant Hoffman, in charge of the recruiting work. For the month ending Thursday, the district turned into the navy 132 men, a record for recruiting since the signing of the armistice.

A new sub-station is being opened at Morehead City, but this will be devoted largely to recruiting men for the air service.

The recruiting office here has been notified by the recruiting inspector, Eastern Division, that enlistments for the South Dakota are now authorized. The South Dakota is an armored cruiser and will be the flagship of Admiral Gleaves, new commander-in-chief of the Asiatic stations.

Recruits may be sent direct to the South Dakota for a cruise of two, three or four years and will give the men an opportunity to visit New York, Panama Canal, Honolulu, China, Japan, the Philippines, Siam and Borneo.

Recruiting officers are authorized to send volunteers for the South Dakota to Portsmouth, N. H., where the ship will be up to August 25. After that, men should be sent to New York up to the date of departure, September 1.

SAFETY LEAGUE MEMBERS ACTIVE

One Member Writes About Dangerous Bridge and Gets It Repaired

That the thousands of children of the North Carolina Safety League in every section of North Carolina, are active during this school vacation period is evidenced by letters from officers and other leagues coming to State Insurance Commissioner James A. Young, under whose direction these leagues have been formed for conservation through fire and accident prevention.

One member of a league in Chatham county writes the commissioner about the dangerous condition of a bridge across Haw river near Haywood, Chatham county, and appeals to the commissioner to see that the dangerous condition is eliminated. Of course Commissioner Young has no authority in such matters, but he brought the matter to the attention of the State Highway Commission and the Chatham county commissioners with explanation as to how the condition of the bridge was brought to his attention.

Assurances come from these authorities that the bridge shall be put in repair with the least possible delay. Along with this assurance comes expression of appreciation for the active interest of the children in these important matters of conservation.

Former Pennsylvania Official Indicted.

Philadelphia, Aug. 16.—A warrant was sworn out by the district attorney's office late today for the arrest of Charles A. Ambler, former insurance commissioner of Pennsylvania, charging him with conspiracy and malfeasance in office in connection with the failure of the North Penn Bank, which closed its doors on July 18 with an apparent shortage of \$2,144,000.
