

FARMERS OBJECT TO CONSOLIDATION

Wilson County People, However, Consider Arguments Advanced By Board

Wilson, Aug. 18.—There was a large meeting of farmers held in the court house here this morning composed of delegates from Gardner's, Saratoga and Tolson townships to protest against the establishment of consolidated schools. Besides the large crowd present a petition signed by 215 more was in the hands of the attorney who represented the dissatisfied ones. It was regretted that all of those who signed the protest could not have been present, for Prof. C. L. Coon made it plain that for the best interest of the parents and children and for all concerned in the matter, and when the meeting adjourned all but a few concluded that they were better informed and were glad they attended the meeting.

The trouble grew out of the fact that two proposed central school houses are about to be erected—one in Gardner's, the other in Saratoga township.

The protestors claimed that they have been discriminated against in the matter of good roads and cited the impassable condition of the roads in bad weather, but appeared better satisfied when they were assured that the present school houses would not be closed until adequate roads were built to transport the children to and from school.

Saturday evening, notwithstanding the excessive heat, two hundred and fifty world war veterans met in the court house here for the purpose of organizing a camp of the American Legion. Col. John F. Bruton addressed the assembly. Music was furnished by a quartette from Company K and the Gardner-Blacks orchestra.

The first statement was made by a sister of the injured lady while she was greatly excited, and when perhaps she had not taken in all the circumstances of the accident.

NORFOLK YOUTH HOLDS TO HIS STORY OF HIGHWAYMAN

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 18.—Testifying in his own defense in cooperation court today, Elier D. Chapman, the 21 year old boy accused of the murder of Mrs. Jean Schaub on the night of April 23, last, admitted having "kissed and hugged" the young woman on the night of the murder but denied that there was any reason why he should wish to "put her out of the way." He had known her not more than ten days, he said, and took no more interest in her than he did in any other young woman employed in the W. T. Grant Company's Norfolk store, of which he was assistant manager. Throughout his cross-examination, Chapman stuck to his original story that the murder was committed by negro highwayman, bent on robbery, as he and the young woman were walking along a lonely stretch of Princess Anne Avenue, which borders on an old cemetery.

Robert Dunlop Breaks Front Door of Safe; Takes \$18.40 From Cash Drawer

When Julia Smith, a negro woman who conducts a cafe at 215 South Blount street, entered her place of business yesterday she discovered that it had been robbed of \$18.04 in cash, but little did she suspect that the robber was then asleep in her home at 107 East Lenoir street. But he was.

Less than two hours after the woman found she had been robbed, Officer Welch arrested Herbert Dunlop, a negro, at the woman's home, where he was asleep. Dunlop boarded at the Smith cafe and roomed at the Smith home. He admitted the robbery.

Dunlop entered the cafe by breaking a glass panel in the front door. It was then easy to take the money from the cash drawer. He was in possession of practically all the money when arrested. Officer Welch saw the negro in the vicinity of the cafe yesterday morning about 3 o'clock. Learning the negro's identity, he soon traced him to the woman's home.

NATIONAL PARTY OF LABOR FORMED

Planned To Hold Convention of Leaders in Chicago in November

Chicago, Aug. 18.—A national labor party will be formed at a convention here in November as a result of steps taken today at a conference of labor organizations representatives of several states.

A temporary committee was named to call the convention on the basis of one delegate to each central labor body, of which there are 700 in the United States, and one delegate for every 500 members of all labor party groups and all local unions.

A constitution and platform will be formulated at the convention and decision made as to what candidates will be entered in the 1920 campaign, it was announced. From 2,500 to 3,000 delegates are expected at the convention according to Duncan McDonald, president of the Illinois Federation of Labor, and chairman of the State labor party. He presided at today's conference.

A resolution was adopted endorsing the Plumb plan for operation of the railroads as advocated at the recent committee hearing in Washington.

The new party will represent the six million members of organized labor in the United States, and will have the co-operation of nonpartisan leagues and farmer organizations in various states," said Robert M. Buck, editor of the official newspaper of the Illinois party.

A national lecture bureau committee was named to arrange for the tour of Arthur Henderson, secretary of the British labor party, in the United States next October. It was announced his lectures on the workings of the British labor party would be a factor in strengthening the new party.

Members of the executive committee are Max Hayes, chairman, Cleveland, Ohio; Abraham Lofkowitz, New York; Charles R. Nuzum, Kansas City; M. T. Bennett, Hartford, Conn.; and Wm. E. Rodriguez, Chicago. The conference concluded its work tonight.

WATER WORKS AND SEWERAGE SYSTEM, WILLIAMSTON, N. C.

Plans are invited until 5:00 o'clock P. M. August 25th, 1919, on furnishing all material, work and appliances and constructing complete municipal waterworks and sewerage systems for the town of Williamston, N. C.

The work comprises: Removing and setting up two old 75-horsepower engines; one new 125-horsepower 12-cylinder engine; two horizontal centrifugal pumps, 150-horsepower each; two boiler feed pumps and feed water heater; two air-compressors; two air-175 pumping motors; all necessary piping, shafting, pulleys and belting; one reinforced concrete reservoir 250,000 gal.; alternate side on a steel reservoir, of same capacity, one hard water tower, 80,000 gal.; capacity, 120 ft. in height; approximately 1 1/2 mile auxiliary mains from 2-inch to 4-inch, or such portion of the same as the Board may determine; approximately 1 1/2 mile auxiliary mains from 4-inch to 12-inch, or such portion of the same as the Board may determine.

Plans and specifications will not be used out, but may be examined at the office of Mr. W. T. Meadows, Williamston, N. C.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check to the sum of \$1,000 which will become a forfeit to the town of Williamston, N. C. in the event the bidder fails to execute the contract after the award.

The successful bidder will be required to execute an indemnity bond with some satisfactory surety company, to the sum of \$25,000, as a guarantee for the proper performance of the contract.

The town of Williamston reserves the right to reject any or all bids and to let the contract in parts to different contractors, if this should seem desirable.
