TENNIS STARS DRAW FOR NATIONAL EVENT

New York, Aug. 18.—With the leading lawn tennis players of America, Australia and Japan entered, the drawing for the 89th annual national singles championship tournament was made here today. The luck of the blind draw distributed the 128 entrants with fair regularity throughout the eight sixteen and with an occasional exception the leading experts should advance several rounds without serious opposition in the matches which begin at Forest Hills, L. I., August 25.

Every section of the United States is represented by its foremost racket stars, while Canada and England each has one entrant. All four Australians, Norman E. Brookes, Gerald Patterson, R. V. Thomas and Randolph Lycett, will compete as well as Ichika Kumagai and S. Kashi, the Japanese stars. Former American champions include E. Lindley Murray, R. Norris Williams, 2nd, William M. Johnston and Maurice E. McLaughlin, while almost every runner-up and the ranking tens of recent years are entered.

TRIPLE TIE FOR LOW MEDAL SCORE

Four Southern Golfers in Franklinton Merchants Not Profiteering; Why Sugar Is High Explained

Pittsburgh, Pa., Aug. 18.—A triple tie for the best medal score resulted today in the 36-hole qualifying round of the National Amateur Golf Championship tournament at the Oakmont Country Club. James S. Manion, a public links player of St. Louis, David Herron, of Oakmont, and Paul Tewkesbury, of Aronimink, turned in the lowest scores—158. Robert T. Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, turned in a card of 159; Louis Jacoly, Charlotte, N. C., made a 165, as did Nelson Whitney, of New Orleans, and J. A. Dean, of Atlanta, scored 170. These were the only Southern players to qualify.

Francis Ouimet, of Woodland, barred since 1916 by a United States Golf Association ruling, struggled through the first while ill in order not to lose his first opportunity of gaining the amateur title. Ouimet was attended by physicians after completing the round. He turned in a card of 166. Charles Evans, Jr., of Edgewater, had a card of 161; Jerome Travers, Upper Montclair, 165, and W. H. Gardner, Buffalo 168. W. C. Fownes, of Oakmont, made 169.

The hopes of many golfers were washed away by the hard rain that fell almost incessantly until evening. Of the eight players who got into the play-off, D. W. Armstrong, of Oakmont, and J. N. Sterns, Jr., of Nassau, won the two remaining places in the match play rounds.

The pairings for the first round of match play are such that if Evans beats Armstrong and Ouimet beats Cleary in the first round the two stars will meet in the second round Wednesday.
