APPEALS TO PRINCE

Tells Reporters He Looks Forward Eagerly To Visit To New York

(Quebes Special to New York World.)
By request of the Prince of Wales,
the American news or appendents covering the royal trip were presented today at the Citadel to the rgal tourist.
With the case of manner and freedom of speech that characterizes the con-duct of hig men when informally con-versing with newspaper men, the Prince laid aside dignity and restraint and showed himself a good fellow.

In this first talk with the writers,

whose faces have for several days been familiar to him, the Prince displayed a sense of humor that none suspected he possessed, he showed no heaftaney

permit the presentation.

Seems Shy at First Glance.

Shy, blushing, shifting from one foot to the other, the Prince today appeared more boyish than usual. He has a habit of nervousness when talking, but the restiveness is physical and not mental, for his words are straightfor-ward and to the point. The blush is not so much embarrasment as a natural accompaniment of his speech. His shynosa is a family characteristic, novertheless he seemed, despite the differ-ence of manner and reddening of face. to be entirely comfortable and even to be disappointed when Admiral Halsey finally suggested that the party would be late for the day's functions if the meeting between Prince and corre-spondents were prolonged. The Prince thrusts out a steady

palm. His grip is firm and lingering. It is a sincere grosp with a pressur in it.

His light blue eyes hold the gaze of the man gazed upon. His lips smile a friendly greeting. If one did not know him to be a man in years and a Prince in station it would be easy to think him a boy in his teens still attending college.

Stepping to the group of three New York newspaper men in the party, he said: "I am glad that the New York papers are represented and I hope to see you often on the tour." Askel when he expected to be in New York, by re-"Probably about November 10. I sail from there to England, you know. My stay in the United States will be brief, I am afraid, but I look forward

to it eagerly."

Assured of a splendid reception by New York, the Prince said to the World correspondent: "New York does things in a big way, doesn't it?" Knows His Naval History

He displayed a knowledge of British naval history in detail, for he remarked: "It is a curious coincidence, TODAY AND SATURDAY — TOM be anchored where the Indomitable was is it not, that the Renoun should now anchored? Of course, one could have hoisted the Indomitable and lost it on the Renoun."

A reference by a correspondent to the fact that "the Renoun is probably the largest vessel of her type," brought from the Prince the smiling retort: Yes she is for the moment. Turning to a movie photographer the Prince said: "You men have been getting some close-ups. It will be very interesting for me to see them in the films you know, and see how bad you

really are." In the laugh that followed somebody suggested: "You will see yourself as good as you are." The Prince smiled: "No, I'll see myself as bad as I am."

He Likes Yankee Familiarity. The World man reminded the Prince that in New York he would face a volley of cameras every inch of his way. He replied: "Yes, I expect an intensive barrage there." Perhaps one of the things that contributes to place the Prince at such complete case was that the correspondents were addressing him directly as "You," and not as "Sir" or Your Royal Highness." He seemed to like the Yankee way of direct approach, which did not discard deference even n its freedom.

The reception over the Prince turned away with a wave of his hand and smiled boyishly: "Well, I'll see you all again later."

His day's functions included a visit to the Shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre, where he saw crutches left behind by cripples who had been benefited at the famous shrine. In the afternoon he spent an hour on a private golf

After divine services tomorrow morning the Prince will return to the Citadel for luncheon and in the early afternoon will motor to St. Martin's Junction, halfway to Montreal. There he will board the special royal train that is to carry him through the remainder of his Canadian tour. The first stop will be Teronto, where he will pass Monday and Tuesday. He will begin a three-days stay in Ottawa Wednes The battle cruiser Renous, flagship of the Prince's squadron, will sail shortly for South America: thence to England. The Dauntless and Dragon, escorting cruisers, will also sail for England in several days. All three are now at Quebec. They will all return America in November to take the Prince from New York.

As for the polka, it was placed on the program at the demand of the veterans themselves, together with the mazurka. themselves, together with the mazurka, the minuet and other dances which were favorites with these old men when, the chivalry and youth of the south they went forth to battle with Lee and

Jackson more than fifty years ago. There was some talk in Atlanta for a while of giving the veterans "seats of honor," on the platform when the reunion was held. But this was quickly squelchedr

"Not on your life," said General N. B. Forrest, son of the famous Confederate cavalry leader and reunion general secretary, who has been attending these events for the past fifteen years. "You won't be able to hold these old You won't be able to hold these old boys on the platform when the hand begins to play. Thoy'll be right there on the floor, and some of these young chaps had better look out, too, for they can 'cut a step' along with the best." The balls will be but two of several

brilliant functions planned for the re-union. The people of Atlanta have subscribed more than \$60,000 to finance the reunion, and much of this sum will be expended for the seal affairs that will be such attractive features of the four days.

IN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$25,000 OF BONDS OF THE CITY OF RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA, FOR THE CONSTRUC-TION OF SEWERS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Raleigh: Section 1. Pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act (chapter 138 of the Public Laws of 1917 of North Carolina, as amended), bonds of the City of Raleigh are hereby authorized to be issued in are negregate principal amount not ex-ceeding \$25,000, for the purpose of en-larging the sewer system of the City of Raleigh by the construction of sami-
