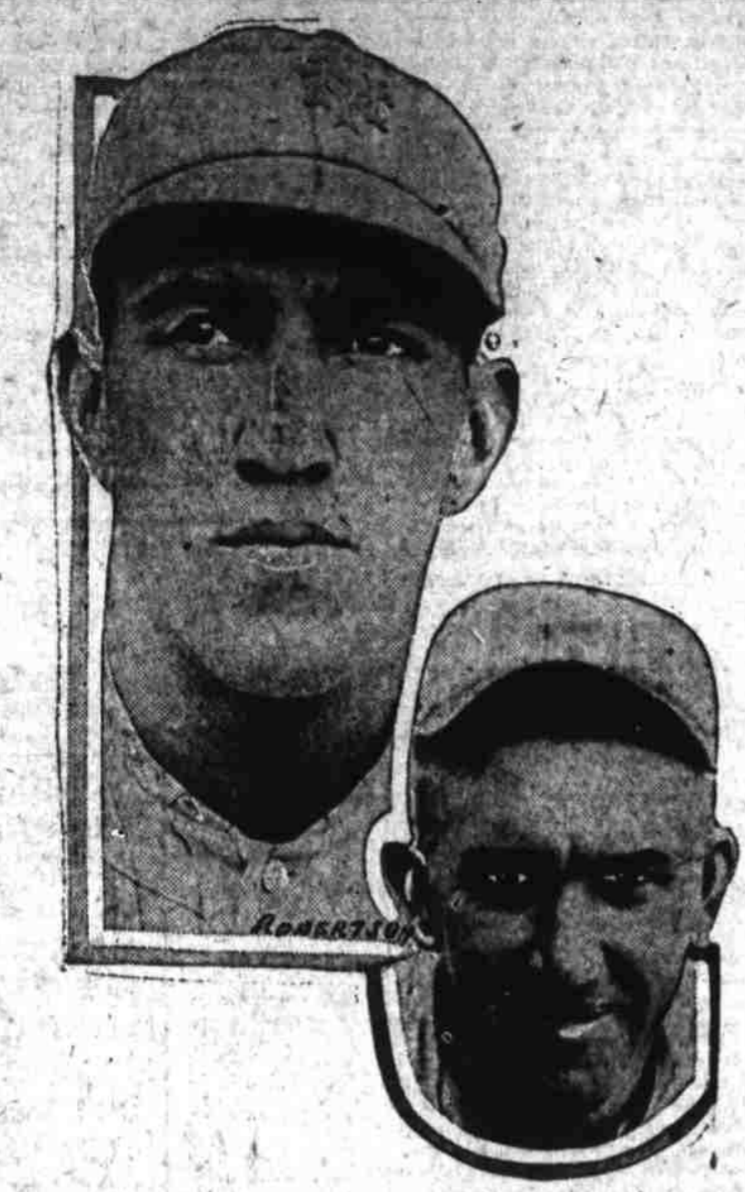
PHILLIES BAT PFEFFER OUT OF BOX FOR WIN

EAST AND WEST IN FINAL TENNIS PLAY

Tilden Opposes Johnston For National Championship in Today's Round

Forest Hill, N. Y., Sept. 1.—East and West will be opposed tomorrow in the final round of the thirty-eighth National Turf Court singles tennis championship on the courts of the Westside Club when William T. Tilden, 2nd, of Philadelphia and William M. Johnston, of San Francisco, meet for the titular honors of the 1919 season. These two survivors of the 128 players who began the tournament last Tuesday won their final brackets in the championship round by defeating respectively, R. Norris Williams, 2nd, of Boston, and Wallace F. Johnson, of Philadelphia. Tilden defeated Williams in straight sets at 6-1, 7-5 and 6-3, while Johnston eliminated Johnson, 2-6, 6-1, 6-3, 6-3.

Viewed from some angles the defeat of Williams might be termed a tennis upset. The champion of 1914 and 1916 created a remarkable impression upon tennis experts and the thousands of spectators who saw him play so successfully against Vincent Richards, of Yonkers, and Willis Davis, of San Francisco. His play today as compared with these exhibitions fell off fully fifty per cent. Tilden outclassed him in every department of the game with the possible exception of placement shooting. The Philadelphia did not employ the same amount of speed and power that he exhibited against Brooks and Kummage. He was, however, far the steadier of the two and Williams in his efforts to get his sharp shooting shots going, piled up an error column which would have caused his defeat against a player of lesser calibre than Tilden.

The point score and stroke analysis shows that Tilden won three sets to love 19 games to 9, 100 points to 75, while Tilden made 27 outs to Williams' 21, 19 sets to 41, four double faults to seven, 19 placements to 24 and two service aces to a like number for the Bostonian.

COLUMBIA TAKES S. A. L. PENNANT

Palmetto Team Shuts Out Charlotte in Morning Game; Second Match Farc

Charlotte, Sept. 1.—Columbia won the South Atlantic League pennant today when that club defeated Charlotte, 5 to 0, in the morning game the visitors outclassing the home club in every department. With the bitter race decided, the first and second place clubs turned the afternoon contest into a farce, which Charlotte won 13 to 3. Several near fights marred the second game. Six thousand persons bought tickets to the opening contest and saw "Lefty" Scoggins hold the home club's heavy artillery silent, allowing only five hits. Columbia players fielded perfectly and brilliantly, and not a hornet passed second. Rube Eldridge who pitched nine innings Friday and ten innings of the Saturday game, was sent to the mound by Manager Burke in a desperate effort to win the crucial contest. Charlotte's six errors gave the pennant away, the errors of Butts alone assuring the visitors of victory.
