MINERS FILE MOTION TO DISSOLVE THE INJUNCTION

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 6.—Taking their first step in the fight against the government's efforts to bring about an end of the coal miners' strike through Federal court action, attorneys for the United Mine Workers' of America today filed a motion in the United States District court here asking that the restraining order issued by Judge Ander week be dissolved. The mo tion will be argued Saturday when the government's petition that the restraining order be made a temperary injunc tion, comes up for hearing.

The motion attacks the right of the

government to interfere in the con troversy and declares that it is with out "equity and clean hands in the prosecution of this suit." The latter assertion was in connection with state ments made to show that the adminis tration in bringing about conferences in Washington between the representatives of the operators and miners, with Secretary of Labor Wilson, recognized the right of collective bargaining but by its later action would arbitrarily deny this right. The charge of lack of equity was based on the argument that the President had dissolved the fuel administration following cessation hostilities and was without authority to re-establish the administratorship "without the exigency of war," and that the United States has thereby brought about confusion and disorder. Continuing the motion declared that "the real and substantial purpose of this suit is to have the court extricate the administration from the unfortunate state of disorder in which it has in-volved itself."

The document attacks the clause of the restraining order which prevents disbursement of strike benefits, declaring that the benefit fund, the property of the members of the miners' organ-ization is denied them without just e and withou

Other sections of the motion declare that the government's petition for an injunction does not disclose that the plaintiff, the United States government, has any interest in the subject matter or in the relief sought and that it does not allege that the common lot of the miners will not be improved by a new wage agreement.

It cites the act of Octboer 15, 1914, as providing that no restraining order shall be issued in any United States court in any case between employers and employes "growing out of a dis-pute concerning terms or conditions of


