Durham, Nov. 6.—Bert Fuller, right hand man of Will Hays, chairman of the Republican National Committee, addressed a meeting of a goodly crowd of prominent Republican workers of this section of the State, at the Conservatory of Music today at noon.

Mr. Fuller urged that Republicans in the State work from the township up, putting up a fight for every county office, instead of limiting their efforts, against Dennis Harden, of Randle-Whitten.

When the legislative program is put through, as planned tonight, Representative Brinson will be host at a dinner at the New Willard tomorrow night for Maynard and will have as his guests members of the North Carolina delegation in Congress. Following this, Maynard will be carried to the meeting tomorrow night of the North Carolina Society where he will be the guest of honor and called on to speak.

MINERS FILE MOTION TO DISSOLVE THE INJUNCTION

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 6.—Taking their first step in the fight against the government's efforts to bring about a end of the coal miners' strike through Federal court action, attorneys for the United Mine Workers of America today filed a motion in the United States District court here asking that the restraining order issued by Judge Anderson last week be dissolved. The motion will be argued Saturday when the government's petition that the restraining order be made a temporary injunction, comes up for hearing.

During the day two new reservation proposals were placed before the Senate and, together with several others presented by individual Senators, will be taken up after the committee list. One was by Senator Knox, Republican, Pennsylvania, proposing that the United States become only a "consulting member" of the league with full liberty to govern its own course in all respects, and the other was by Senator Johnson, Republican, California, relating to equalization of voting power in the league.

Trying To Prevent Strike. Miami, Fla., Nov. 6.—Behind closed doors, carefully curtailed, representatives of organized labor and the business interests of the city, president of city council and chamber of commerce, today struggled, each in his own way, to prevent the general strike of several thousand workmen comprising twenty-seven unions affiliated with the American Federation of Labor. The strike is called for Monday, November 10. It was snid after the meeting that nothing had been accomplished.

GIANT AIR LINER GETS TO CHICAGO ON JOURNEY

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 6.—The giant Lawson air liner, carrying eleven persons, including three women, arrived here today from Indianapolis, making the trip in two hours. The huge machine ploughed into the mud in landing at Ashburn Field and several teams of horses will be required to drag it on dry ground. The machine will leave for Milwaukee within two days.

Boston, Nov. 6.—The completion of the destroyer Read in 54½ working days, a world record in shipbuilding, was celebrated officially today when the vessel, fully equipped, was formally turned over to the navy by representatives of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, Ltd. The achievement of the Squantum Ship Workers was recognized by Secretary of the Navy Daniels, who sent a telegram of congratulation.

Elon College, Nov. 6.—The Woman's Missionary conference of the Christian church for the State of North Carolina will assemble here on Saturday for a two-day session. About 300 delegates are expected. Rev. and Mrs. E. K. McCord, of the Japan mission, will be honor guests and take a prominent part in the deliberations of the conference. Toshio Sato San, of Japan, and Victor M. Rivera, of Porto Rico, where the women have workers, will also speak. Other special features of the program will be addresses of the State president, Mrs. W. H. Carroll, of the Southern convention; President, Mrs. W. A. Harper, by Dr. J. O. Atkinson, Dr. J. W. Harrell, Rev. George D. Eastes, officers' reports, and a pageant by the Young People's Missionary Society of the Burlington Christian church.

GERMAN GENERALS WANT TO TESTIFY ON THE WAR

Zurich, Nov. 5.—(French Wireless Service.)—Lieutenant-General von Falkenhayn, formerly chief of the German great general staff and Rupprecht, the former Crown Prince of Bavaria, have written to the chairman of the German commission, appointed to inquire into the question of the responsibility for the war, asking to be heard on the subject of the military measures taken in Belgium and France. Prince Rupprecht is in Switzerland.

Conneaut, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Three men were probably killed this afternoon when the boiler on a Bessemer and Lake Erie Railroad freight engine blew up six miles southeast of here, near the Pennsylvania State line. BIDS FOR CANTONMENTS OPENED BY DEPARTMENT

Washington, Nov. 6.—The highest bid received by the War Department for the purchase of the cantonments in Chattanooga and Chickamauga National Parks was that of R. A. Goldman, of Chicago, who offered \$176,000 for all the properties constructed by the government. The second highest bid was \$124,500 of the Fuel Wrecking Company, Chicago, offered \$331,000 for all the improvements at Camp Mills, Mineola, L. I. The General Engineering Company, of Indianapolis, bid \$186,110 and R. C. Hoffman Co., Baltimore, \$121,945 for the New York camp.

For the improvements at Camp Shelby, Hattiesburg, Mississippi, Harris Bros. of New York, bid \$155,000; Frank B. Cole of Newman, Ga., \$122,234, and the General Engineering Co., Indianapolis, \$116,200.

In the case of each camp there were numerous smaller bids and alternative bids for various parcels.
