

Drastic Conservation of Coal In South Urged By Regional Committee

duction, the Railroad Administration's statement said:
In the first week of the strike the average number of cars of bituminous coal loaded daily was 2,905, or 26 per cent. of the pre-strike average; in the second week loading was at the rate of 10,908 cars or 30 per cent of the normal rate, a gain over the first week of 4 per cent. Last week the third of the strike production steadily increased and reached nearly 40 per cent of normal. The present week promises so far a still better showing.

Production now is mainly in the East, in the South and in the Rocky Mountain region. In the Central States where bituminous coal is so largely used there is little or no present output. The railroads have the difficult and unusual task of moving West a large part of the production of such fields as the Poshontas and Pennsylvania fields that normally moves East. The 22,000,000 tons of the railroad and on November 1 was as evenly divided as possible over the country, but in the sections where there had been no production supplies have become depleted and coal from the Eastern producing fields has been and is being sent West to fill these needs.

BARACA-PHILATHEA SECRETARY SPEAKS HERE
Mrs. N. Buckner, of Asheville, Speaks In Interest of Soldiers at Oteen

Mrs. N. Buckner, general secretary of the Baraca and Philathea organizations of the State, addressed a gathering of Raleigh Baraca and Philathea last night at 8 o'clock. Mrs. Buckner spoke in general of her work over the State and closed with an appeal for articles to go to the wounded soldiers at Oteen, the government hospital for wounded men near Asheville. Among the articles needed, and which she said most and will be gotten together by Raleigh Baptists, are: 500 comfort kits, 500 housewives, 200 razors and 1,000 Christmas tags, with nuts, fruits, candies, etc.

Mrs. Buckner told in detail of the good work along all lines done by the Baraca and Philathea of the State, and that along with them "all the clubs and associations of the state, both religious and social, have well upheld their end of the work."
Mrs. Buckner had a good audience, considering that she had in competition with her Vice-President Marshall at the auditorium. Mrs. Buckner left last night for Asheville at the conclusion of her talk.

At the American Embassy late today it was said that no answer had been received from the Mexican government relative to the American government's note demanding the release of Mr. Jenkins. So far as is known here today, Mr. Jenkins remains in the penitentiary at Puebla, still refusing to give bail.

Dispatches received from Puebla say that Mr. Jenkins' release by the authorities is expected momentarily.

Soldiers Given Freedom.

The office of Major Stedman was in-

formed by the War Department today that Staley A. Cook and Curtis Smith, sons of well known Burlington families, will be restored to service by December 31 and subsequently given an honorable discharge from the service. They are at present serving a twelve months' sentence for conduct unbecoming a soldier while in France.

The evidence in the case and the statements of the boys agree and the burden of all is that the French girls were unwillingly forced to testify against the Burlington boys at a court-martial hearing after they had been satisfied of the innocence of the two.

In a farewell party, a visit by the boys to the home of the girls resulted in charges being preferred against them for stealing 720 francs and a watch. The next day the boys satisfied their French friends they meant nothing more than a joke and a half dozen times the girls refused to appear and testify against them. Finally they were arrested and made to appear and their statements of the case resulted in a court-martial sentence for both young Cook and his companion. They are at present at Fort Jay, N. Y.

A Greensboro case in which Major Stedman has been interested results in the remittance of the unserved portion upon Russell Scott, of Pomona Mills. Scott will get his liberty right away.

Major Stedman has other cases pending with the clemency section of the Judge Advocate General's Department. He has satisfied himself that the sentences imposed in many instances were

extremely severe and where he has carried the matter to the Department, has been successful in getting some favorable adjustment.

The sub-scale committee held a perfunctory meeting today at which Dr. Garfield's statement of principles was discussed. Pending word from the Cabinet adjournment was taken until tomorrow.

Neither operators nor miners were hopeful tonight of a settlement before next week. While the sub-scale committee plans to remain in session, adjourning from day to day, many operators have arranged to spend Thanksgiving Day at their homes.

Explanation of Profits. Charging that former Secretary McAdoo had been "studiously malicious," George H. Cushing, managing director of the American Wholesale Coal Association, in a statement tonight, explained that the 2,000 per cent. of which the former secretary complained, was not figured on either volume of business or capital stock. This percentage, he

said, was made in the case of abandoned mines, worked on a co-operative basis, where the only capital consisted of tools and supplies.

In connection with Dr. Garfield's statement before the joint wage scale committee yesterday that the operators could not expect the profits allowed during the war, it was recalled tonight that Rembrandt Peale, operator, and John White, miner representative and coal expert of the Fuel Administration, in their final report to Dr. Garfield, concurred in a statement that it would have been possible for the operators to pay an increase in wages out of the established coal price without raising the price to the consumer.

Mr. Peale and Mr. White pointed out that operators generally had been paying bonuses and other forms of increased compensation above the established wage scale in order to get miners to turn out coal to meet the big demand.
