ARRANGED TO MAKE CONCERTED RAIDS

In connection with the announcement of the raids tonight, Attorney General Palmer made public a letter which he had written to Masley Hoynes, state attorney, for Cook county at Chicago, in which Mr. Hoynes was requested to defer the local raid conducted there last night.

Mr. Palmer explained in his letter that the Department of Justice had planned a nation-wide campaign against the same people which were to be raided by Mr. Hoynes' agents in Chicago. Department officials said they were without information as to why the Chicago raid went through last night when Mr. Hoynes had full information as to the plans of the Federal agents to do the same work tonight.

EMISSARIES IN MANY CITIES

Advance information on the activities of the communist party revealed that its emissaries were in many cities, boring into labor organizations which hitherto have been noted for their conservatism.

Literature obtained by Federal agents made it appear that the communist leaders were concentrating on plans to obtain control of well founded labor groups. Through this method they were to exert their power politically and to put forward candidates which could be regarded by government officials as nothing more than destructive elements within the present government.

The communist labor group was said to have directed its propaganda more generally among the foreign element of citizenship. From several sources Federal agents gleaned information that the communist labor party was appealing to the foreign workers with the argument that the present government was unfriendly to them and that their rights would never be respected by the appointed authorities.

The insertion of the word "Labor" in the name of this party was regarded by officials as only subterfuge, the leaders realizing that it would lend strength to their argument among foreigners. Mr. Garvin expressed the opinion that the leaders of the two parties had a "working agreement" and planned eventually to bring all the radicals under one communist party and thereby smother enough strength to upset the constituted government.

Officials are working on the theory that a higher power is directing the work of both organizations and the leaders who are behind this directing hand only recently have come to this country from Russia. The belief, they said was supported by evidence gathered by representatives of this and the allied governments in the heart of Soviet Russia. It is known that agents of the allied nations have been working for nearly two years along the followers of Lenin and Trotsky, and their efforts have resulted in connecting links in the chain of Soviet propaganda in this country and the Soviet leaders in Russia.

strength and in the expectation that this federation, welcomed by the Western allies as promising the erection of a future barrier to German expansion southward, would be able, with the support of Britain, France and the United States to obtain the realization of its wholly legitimate aspirations to an outlet on the Adriatic and the possession of the purely Slav sea front, from Fiume to Cattaro.

Such was the policy of Great Britain and France, witnessed by the reservation of Fiume for the Southern Slavs in the secret treaty of London. With this policy America promptly aligned herself, when the President went to Paris.

But unfortunately Italian policy took the exactly opposite route. The failure of the Sonnino-Salandra Ministry to secure Fiume was seized upon by the opposition, by Giolitti, as the basis for an attack made for domestic political reasons.

Orlando at Paris was forced to endeavor to repair this failure of Sonnino, it became a matter of utmost importance for purely domestic reasons to get Fiume. In order to fortify the position of Italy abroad, an intense propaganda was launched within the Italian kingdom for Fiume and Italian passion was roused to the limit to strengthen the hand of Orlando in the Paris conference.

But at the same time a far more active and much less defensible campaign was carried on along the Adriatic. Every effort was made to make use of the difference between the various factions of the new Slav State to promote disunion. The Croats were turned against the Serbs, the Montenegrins were incited against the Serbs, money and military force were employed without stint. If only they were possible at this moment to get access to the reports of American naval officers stationed in Adriatic waters a final revelation of this phase of the Italian campaign would be supplied. On one occasion at least, only the sudden and unhesitating intervention of an American naval officer at Cattaro prevented the dispatch of an Italian regiment to Cetigne, to "assist" at a Montenegrin plebiscite to decide whether the Montenegrins would join Serbia or remain separate.

Slavs Remain Confident. In the face of endless provocation the Slavs remained confident of the ultimate good faith of their western allies, who bade them wait in patience. President Wilson's famous appeal to the Italian people over the head of Orlando had an immense effect in Jugoslavia. The steady refusal of the western allies to consent to any Italian demands for a long time kept Slav hopes alive.

But since the D'Annunzio episode there has been a distinct change in the situation. The failure of the western allies to take any action in the face of Italian deeds has caused a revulsion of feeling. The Croats are losing some measure of confidence in the strength of the new state. Italian money has been successful to a degree in rousing old jealousies and accentuating new rivalries. The same has been true in Montenegro, even in Slovenia where is mounting discontent. Meanwhile the official word has been

leading more and more toward military action as the sole solution of the situation. At the present moment Jugoslavian divisions are actually ready to resist any Italian aggression and resistance worthy of note, while the charge that the quality of the Slav troops is such as to make their resistance worthy of note, which the character of the country lends itself to a guerilla war of almost unlimited extent.

The factors, however, materially modify the military circumstances. In the first place the vastly superior army of the Italians, speaking numerically, together with the enormous accumulation of military material resulting from the capture of Austrian armies, would promise certain victory were it not for the fact that the internal condition of Italy is such that the arrival of a new war would almost inevitably bring Italian revolution.

Thus we may quite confidently expect that if the Italians make any new invasion of the Slav lands of the eastern shore of the Adriatic, if they endeavor to make good permanently claims to the northern half of Dalmatia, they will at once enter upon a new war and face a terrible crisis within the kingdom. Such a war would probably prove the last straw to the mass of Italian people who see their country well nigh ruined financially by two recent wars and now embarking upon the third.

On the other hand Serbian success, predicated on a domestic revolution in Italy must be discounted by the fact that two and possibly three of the neighbors of Jugoslavia are likely to attack this new state, once it is involved in a dispute with Italy. These three states are Rumania, Bulgaria and Hungary.

The Rumanian Grievance. The Rumanian grievance is well known. Before the Western allies enlisted Rumania and to get her into the war they made her certain promises. Among other things they promised her the whole of the Banat. But at Paris they refused to honor their old agreement and gave one corner of this old moral of Hungary to Serbia. The result was an instant feud between Serb and Rumanian, the latter have never accepted the cession of this bit of the Banat to the Jugo-Slavs and only wait a propitious moment to occupy this district, thus attacking Jugo-Slavia in the back at the moment she is involved in a war with the Italians along the Adriatic.

The Bulgarians on their side have never resigned their claims to Macedonia, to establish which they have fought three wars in six years. But as a consequence of this last war they have not only continued to remain outside of Macedonia, but they have had to give

up Strumitza, Tharibrod, and a strip of front lands near Wladia. As to Hungary the situation is less clear, but the desire to regain their old Slav lands certainly exists among the Magyars and has never been worked upon by Italian intrigue.

Never in the days when the peace of Europe hung by a single thread did the Balkan situation seem more critical than today. War between the Slavs and the Italians seems now to many of the former the sole method of preserving their new national existence and the Italians have sought to destroy this state by intrigue now continued to offer not protests but legitimate causes for Slav military resistance. And while Jugo-Slavia is menaced by Rumania, Bulgarian and perhaps Magyar attacks from the rear Italy faces the possibility of revolution behind her new front.
