

SURVEY DISCLOSES MANY OPEN FIELDS

Red Cross Completes Preliminary Work of Co-ordinating Activities

COMMITTEE WILL FORM COUNTY WELFARE COUNCIL

Mass Meeting of Workers Held in Christ Church Yesterday Afternoon; Report Endorses School Bond Issue; Would Put Street Cleaning Under Health Department.

A wide field of activity and a vast amount of work to be done toward making Raleigh and Wake county a better place to live in is disclosed in the conclusions of the report of the civic survey begun a month ago under the auspices of the local Red Cross and submitted to an open meeting of citizens yesterday afternoon at Christ church.

After hearing the report, and a brief discussion of it, motion was offered empowering the chairman of the meeting to form a committee to draw up a constitution for the Wake County Welfare Council that will embrace every organization engaged in welfare work, coordinate their activities and bring a systematic effort to the achievement of the desired ends of those interested in it.

Members of the committee are as follows: Mr. R. D. W. Connor, chairman, representing the Kiwanis club; Mr. R. N. Childress, county welfare officer; Dr. W. A. Withers, the Y. M. C. A.; Maurice H. Beaman, the Chamber of Commerce; Mr. E. J. Crow, the Rotary Club; Mrs. Brown Shepherd, the Travelers' Aid; Mrs. W. A. Hicks, the Woman's Club, and Miss Daisy Ensign, of the Associated Charities.

The survey was begun in March under the direction of Mr. Victor S. Woodward, representing the Southeastern Division of the Red Cross. The work was placed in the hands of ten volunteer committees, with a membership of five each. Every phase of community activity has been investigated thoroughly; the activities that are being taken to better conditions, and recommendations as to what ought to be done.

Dr. Barber attacked this picture also, asserting that no community should tolerate such pictures to come and vitiate the minds of the youth of the city.

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BIGGEST MONTH IN HIGHWAY BUILDING

State Commission's Agreements and Contracts Total Several Million

March was the biggest month in the history of the State Highway Commission, according to figures given out by Commissioner Page yesterday. In the past month surveys were completed for 150 miles of new roads, project statements approved by the Federal government totaled \$8,500 miles of highway, agreements signed for 67 miles and contracts let for 39 miles of roads.

New projects were surveyed in eleven counties. The total appropriation approved by the Federal government was \$1,107,163. Agreements were signed with the Federal Department of Agriculture totaling \$1,104,816.94. Contracts let were for 39 miles of road in seven counties, amounting to \$645,131. Actual construction was begun on six new projects. A number of roads were given their final inspection, accepted and paid for.

NAME RECREATION HALL IN MEMORY OF TAR HEEL

Lakehurst Proving Grounds, Lakehurst, N. J., April 10.—A general order issued by the War Department has been received here authorizing building No. 53, which is being erected as a place of recreation for the soldiers at this post, to be named "Manning Hall" in memory of the late Sergeant Claude J. Manning who died here with pneumonia on the 8th day of February.

Sergeant Manning lived at Roanoke Rapids, North Carolina, before enlist-

ing in the army, seven years ago, having served four years on the Hawaii Islands, three years on the Border of Mexico, being transferred last November to Lakehurst Proving Grounds, as a gas instructor in the Chemical Warfare Service. His records show him to have been an excellent soldier of rare judgment and he was several times recommended for a commission, but was unable to pass the physical examination on account of a very serious wound received while playing ball.

He was an enthusiastic baseball player and, it is said, that he was responsible for the team of his company, of

which he was manager, winning the championship of Hawaii Islands in 1916. Sergeant Manning was highly esteemed by all who knew him and the sympathy of the officers and men of this post is extended to his mother and sister, Mrs. Margaret Manning and Miss Eleanor of Richmond, Virginia, who bereave his death.
