UNDERWOOD GETS OUT WHEN AUDITOR MAKES HIS REPORT

Fayetteville Mayor and Also Chief of Police Offer Their Resignations

BOARD OF ALDERMEN QUICK TO ACCEPT THEM

Alleged Lack of System in Keeping Records Revealed By Report of Special Auditor, Who Writes at Some Length; Citizens Nominate Rankin For Mayor

Fayetteville, April 30.—At a meeting of the board of aldermen this afternoon, following report by a special auditor showing an alleged remarkable lack of system in the police department and mayor's court and the receipt and expenditure of money without keeping a proper record, Mayor John Underwood, candidate for State insurance commissioner, and Chief of Police Paul H. Merker offered their resignations, which were accepted by the board.

The aldermen then elected City Attorney Henry E. Williams mayor to fill the unexpired term of Mayor Underwood and City Detective W. W. Hewett to the place vacated by Chief Merker.

At a great mass meeting of Democrats here tonight Charles Rankin, a prominent business man, was nominated for mayor of Fayetteville in place of Mr. Underwood, who was nominated in the primary, but declined to run.

The special auditor, George B. Wilson, retained by the city board of audit and finance, has been in Fayetteville for some time and engaged in a check up of the records of the mayor's court and police department, and his report reveals an astonishing condition, it is claimed.

The audit covers the period from June 4, 1919, to March 31, 1920. The report shows that all money collected by Mayor R. J. Lamb, who served as chief of police until August 6 last year, was "properly accounted for," with the exception of \$70 dollars, this being due to clerical errors.

In addition to instances of cases of funds paid in "for fines cost, forfeitures and privilege taxes with no proper record being made, the report says: "Other monies have been collected from time to time by the mayor, as has been admitted by him, of which there is no record, also expenditures have been made by the chief of police and mayor, but just how much has been collected and how much expended we have been unable to ascertain."

"We find the records of the chief of police and the mayor's court very incomplete. We understand it is the custom to destroy warrant to cases without warrants, that cases are tried anywhere at any time and for that reason the chief of police says the only cases which have been locked are those from which he received any money."

"We call your attention to the great number of warrants marked 'dismissed' and suggest that the police committee of your board of aldermen examine such cases as there are quite a number, showing changes and erasures, because we have been unable to determine whether any of these amounts have been collected or not."

"We find the mayor is in the habit of reducing the privilege tax which is in violation of city ordinance, fixing the rate privilege taxes. In our opinion all matters pertaining to refund or reduction of privilege taxes comes under the supervision of control of the board of aldermen."

Unable to Produce Records. "When we called upon the chief of police to produce his records, including the records of the desk sergeant, he advised us that about six weeks ago his desk of metal constitution had been broken open and the records asked for together with some money were taken. Hence his inability to produce the records asked for. He stated to us, however, that he reported the facts to his mayor."

"We wish to call your attention to the fact that the mayor's docket only shows three cases docketed between Monday, October 27, and Thursday, October 30, the days upon which the fair was being held. We also wish to call your attention to the very few number of warrants dismissed during that period."

Mayor Underwood declared this afternoon that he would make a full statement later and would be able to explain every seeming discrepancy affecting himself.

GOLDSBORO MAN HONORED BY CARNEGIE COMMISSION

Lt. David M. Prince, Drowned in Rescuing Boy, Awarded Medal

Pittsburg, Pa., April 30.—Lieut. David M. Prince, of Goldsboro, N. C., who was drowned while trying to rescue a boy from a flooded road near his home July 26, 1919, is one of twelve heroes honored by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission, according to an announcement made here today.

Walter Ross, of West Spencer, N. C., who stopped a runaway horse and saved the occupants of a buggy, also awarded a bronze medal. One silver medal and eleven bronze medals were awarded to hero today by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission, in recognition of noteworthy acts by men and women who sought to help others at their own peril.

The silver medal went to Frank W. Roberts, chief engineer of the Masonic Home at Elizabethtown, Pa., who saved the lives of three young girls who, while wading, had got into deep water and were drowning.

Romance resulted from the efforts of Miss Hilda M. Clark, of 3738 Maryland avenue, Baltimore, to save the life of J. P. King, a student at Huron, O., September 7, 1916. King was seized with a cramp while swimming in Lake Erie and was rescued by Miss Clark, whose name now appears on the records of the commission as "Mrs. J. P. King."

DRY LEAGUE OKES GOVERNOR LOWDEN

He Will Be Able To Command Prohibition Support If Nominated By G. O. P.

Westerville, O., April 30.—Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, is the only residential candidate so far whom the Anti-Saloon League of America has approved as suitable to the prohibitionists.

In a statement given out tonight, Dr. P. A. Baker, general superintendent of the League, says, after a brief review of Governor Lowden's record on prohibition that "prohibitionists consistently can support him if he is nominated."

Senator Warren G. Harding's prohibition record is reviewed at considerable length, but no definite statement as to his acceptability or non-acceptability is made. "Senator Harding of Ohio, usually votes with the drys but always talks for the wets," the statement says.

Senator Hiram Johnson of California, the statement says, "is being solidly supported by the liquor interests of California, not because of any particular services he has rendered them, but because he seems to command the support of the disinterested, and the liquor people just at this time are very much discontented," and also possibly because a Sacramento, California paper "has announced Mr. Hoover's dry convictions."

The statement reiterates the position of the league as regards Governor James M. Cox of Ohio, and Governor Edwards is not really a candidate, but is being run as a side partner to Governor Cox in the hope of accumulating some wet strength that may be turned over to Cox at an opportune time."

CHICAGO PREPARES FOR PREVENTING OUTBREAKS

Sixty Suspects Rounded Up By Police In Effort To Prevent Violence

Chicago, Ill., April 30.—State and city forces are prepared to combat any overt act that might grow out of the various demonstrations planned for tomorrow in celebration of May Day. Sixty more suspects were rounded up by the police today in a continuation of the drive that resulted in the arrest of more than 300 men and several women last night.

One of the men, who gave his name as John Juck, was arrested while distributing hand bills announcing a May Day meeting. Some of the bills urged revolt by "the revolutionary proletariat," the police said.

Huge quantities of "literature of a radical nature were distributed throughout the Westside today. One hand bill, by the police to be signed 'General Membership of the I. W. W.,' said: 'Workers, line up with revolutionary proletariat of countries. Harrah for international solidarity! Lay down your tools! Fold your arms on May Day; surge to the big mass meeting.' A May Day strike of clothing workers was said to have been called by the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, the International Tailors' Union and the International Association of Machinists in protest against the imprisonment of Eugene V. Debs.

ATLANTIC CITY EARLY IN MORNING

Secretary Daniels Joins Homeward Bound Vessels On Last Leg of Trip

TWO-HOUR SPEED TEST DURING THE AFTERNOON

Review of Vessels in New York Harbor Today After Which Secretary of Navy Will Talk To Thousands of People Over Wireless Telephone; Some New Shooting Records

On Board the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, at Sea, April 30.—(By Wireless via Cape May, N. J.)—Secretary of the Navy Daniels joined the homeward bound Atlantic fleet today on the last leg of its journey for New York and from the quarter deck of the flagship Pennsylvania saw seven speeding dreadnoughts surrounded by a screen of destroyers with seaplanes from the Norfolk Base encircling the group.

The secretary, who will review the fleet in New York tomorrow, and his party boarded the flagship inside the Virginia capes, and when the super-dreadnought resumed her place, a special two hour speed test under perfect weather conditions was held, during which a pace of 19 knots was reached.

SECRETARY AND PARTY JOIN FLEET OFF CAPE

Newport News, Va., April 30.—Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels and a small party of Norfolk and Portsmouth people left the Hampton Roads naval base at 8:20 o'clock this morning on the destroyer Goldsborough to review the Atlantic fleet off the southern drill grounds. The party will board the flagship Pennsylvania in Lynnhaven Roads from which craft the secretary will inspect the fleet.

Most of the first line ships of the fleet reached the southern drill grounds early this morning, the destroyers flanking the larger craft on the trip up the coast.

While it is impossible to get a definite statement at this time, wireless reports have leaked out that several records were hung up by the gunners of the fleet during maneuvers at Guantanamo Bay.

Contrary to first reports, none of the ships of the fleet were sent to Mexican waters, according to advices from the naval base.

The naval fleet will proceed to New York today, the secretary making the trip up the coast on the Pennsylvania. Admiral Henry B. Wilson recently announced that New York would be the first headquarters. He gave no reason and it is assumed that this step was taken as a result of the burning of the Chamberlain hotel at Old Point, there now being no convenient place on the Roads for the friends and relatives of the officers of the fleet to stop.

Secretary Daniels will talk to thousands of people in New York Saturday morning over wireless telephone if an experiment to be made proves successful. He stated last night that he is highly interested in the experiment and that if successful it will mean a long stride in wireless telephony.

Secretary Daniels said last night in a speech in Portsmouth that Hampton Roads is the capital of the United States navy and that the government will continue to improve it until it is the greatest naval base in the world.

REPUBLICANS OF SENATE FOREIGN RELATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT OUT NEW BILL

Washington, April 30.—A joint resolution proposing repeal of resolutions by Congress declaring a state of war with Germany and Austria-Hungary was reported out today by the Senate Foreign Relations committee by a strict party vote.

Introduced by Senator Knox, Republican, of Pennsylvania, as a substitute for the Republican resolution recently passed by the House, the measure was formally presented to the Senate late in the day by Senator Lodge, the Republican leader, and the announcement by Senator Knox that he would open debate on it Wednesday.

Plenty of Discussion. Leaders of both parties predicted several weeks of discussion with little prospect of action until near the time set for a recess for the National conventions.

In some quarters the opinion was expressed that President Wilson in the midst of the debate, might return the treaty of Versailles to the Senate.

Virtually solid Democratic opposition to the substitute was predicted by leaders of the party. Senator McCumber, Republican member of the Foreign Relations committee, who did not attend the meeting, said he did not probably other Republicans would do so.

The vote on the measure was nine to six all Republicans present favoring it and Democrats opposing. Senator Shields, Democrat, of Tennessee, also was absent. Republicans said it was designed to meet objections raised in the House that a resolution declaring the war ended would be unconstitutional and beyond the power of Congress.

FROM FLORIDA TO NEW YORK IN SINGLE DAY BY PASSENGER SEAPLANE

New York, April 30.—An air flight from Miami, Fla., to New York with one stop, in fifteen hours and 35 minutes flying time, was made today by the passenger seaplane "Miss Miami," piloted by Harry Rogers of the American Flying Club. The long journey of nearly 1,500 miles along the coast line was interrupted at Morehead City, N. C., where a stop was made for fuel.

The pilot who made his landing in darkness in the Hudson river near 86th street, was aided by Sidney Schroeder and Edward F. Bohn, also of the American Flying Club. Letters were brought from Mayor Wm. F. Smith, of Miami, to Mayor Hylan of New York and from the President of the Miami Chamber of Commerce to the New York body.

PROPOSE REPEAL OF WAR MEASURES

Republicans of Senate Foreign Relations Committee Report Out New Bill

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To Repeal War Resolution. Straight repeal of the war resolutions is the principal object of the Knox substitute, which would request the President to establish friendly diplomatic and commercial relations with Germany and with "the governments and people of Austria and Hungary."

Like the House resolution it would reserve all American rights under the treaty of Versailles and provide for repeal of war legislation and war powers of the President. It would hold German property until all American war claims were satisfied, but does not include the House provision for acceptance of the resolution's terms by Germany within forty-five days under penalty of a commercial embargo.

A formal report only on the resolution was filed by Senator Lodge and Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, administration leader in the treaty fight, decided to submit a minority report, but to present the opposition's arguments during the debate.

SECRETARY POST BOTH ATTACKED AND DEFENDED

Members of House Committee Claim Government Efforts Frustrated

Washington, April 30.—A statement by Louis F. Post, assistant secretary of labor of radical deportation cases, was attacked and defended today before the House rules committee, which is investigating Mr. Post's official conduct.

Members of the immigration committee, headed by Chairman Johnson, declared they had evidence that government efforts to break up "the most damnable conspiracy in the nation's history" were practically nullified through release by the Department of Labor, largely at the instance of Mr. Post, of most of the 5,000 Communists arrested in the nation-wide raids.

The course of the Department of Labor, including that of the assistant secretary, was defended by Jackson H. Ralston, counsel for Mr. Post, who declared that the only criticism that could be directed against his administration was that he had "exercised humanity" and had proceeded on the theory that only in most exceptional cases should a man be torn from his family and sent from the country. Mr. Ralston attacked the Department of Justice, asserting its agents had used methods in dealing with alleged radicals that were not countenanced even in Russia when the Czarist regime was at the height of its power.

GODWIN WILLING FOR ONE PRIMARY BUT LYON ISN'T

Col. John G. Shaw, of Fayetteville, Issued Challenge To Let High Man Win

INTEREST CENTERS IN THREE-CORNERED FIGHT

Whiteville Solicitor Says He's Running For Congress and Not Playing To Galleries; Godwin Reviews His Record and Rests His Case With People of Sixth District

Washington, D. C., April 30.—Washington's political interest in North Carolina today shifted to the Sixth district and Congressman Godwin's ready acceptance of "Highland John" G. Shaw's challenge to himself and Homer Lyon. The Fayetteville contender for the Sixth district member's seat announced by wire that he is willing to let the first primary decide the fight the high man to be declared the nominee.

This is perfectly agreeable to Mr. Godwin but to Solicitor Homer Lyon it is not so agreeable. Indeed, the Columbus county man even intimates that Colonel Shaw is engaging in an interesting diversion instead of engaging in an honest and good-faith race for Congress.

Solicitor Lyon says he is running and must let the people decide who is to be nominated. "The method of nominating candidates prescribed by the State primary law is satisfactory to me but if you and Lyon agree that the candidate receiving the highest vote in the first primary be declared the nominee I will cheerfully agree also."
