### NO VIOLENCE FOR MAY DAY EXPECTED OFFICIALS STATE

After Checking Over Confidential Reports, Confidence Is Restored

HOWEVER, RADICALS TO **BE WATCHED CLOSELY** 

Gigantic Propaganda Demonstrations Planned In Many Places But Department Agents Won't Try To Prevent Talking; Frown On Appeals For Strikes

Washington, April 30 .- After checkng over confidential reports from all parts of the country, government officiels expressed confidence tonight that threatened May Day demonstrations by radicals would not result in any nationwide attempt at violence.

While taking this view of the situation, the Department of Justice renewed its warning to local authorities everywhere that if the radical elements were to be kept under control every law enforcing agency. State and Federal, must be awake and equal to the dangers real and funcied.

Assistant Attorney General Garyan who directed raids on Communist and Communist Labor party organizations in January, declared as he went home for the night that late reports indicated what violence might occur would be spo-

Plan Gigantic Demonstrations Most of these reports showed that the radicals were preparing gigantic propa-ganda demonstrations, but meetings are scheduled in many places and it is at these that trouble may develop, according to Mr. Garvan. The department, he said, would allow "those gatherings to talk themselves blue" but govern-ment agents would observe the tenor of agitation. Agents have been instructed "not to incite or excite trouble in any

such assemblages." such assemblages. It was disclosed by Mr. Gurvan that several members of Congress, three Federal Judges and an atterney recently active in investigating radical disturbances had been marked for assassination. With the early discovery of the plots, however, Mr. Garvan believed the officials, against whose lives the plots were directed, now are amply

protected. Appeals of the Communist Labor leaders for May Day strikes appear not to have met with a kindly reception, although there were threats of strikes in some sections. Thousands of workers may lay down their tools tomorrow but Mr. Garvan believed this would be more in the nature of a declaration of a holiday than with a malicious intent

Workers May Stay Out Timber workers in Wisconsin and Washington may remain away work, according to reports. Federa agents advige I, however, that their la test information disproved claims of di-rect collusion between those workers and the radical leaders.

Mr. Gervan called attention to the ap-

parent unlimited amount of money employed by the communist labor party in fomenting disorders, declaring that, at no time in history, had a radical movement been so plentifully financed. He traced the source of these funds to Amsterdam and thence to Russia,

The amount of radical literature circulated within the last week was described by Mr. Gavan as "amazing" as he pointed to the scores of different perhe pointed to the scores of different per-iodicals, pamphlets and circulars to-gether with special editions of radical newspapers piled in his office, appeal-ing for a "May Day show of power". Exponents of direct action, he contin-ued, were taking advantage of an op-portunity while the nation awaited developments "to lay their incendiarsm on the people's doorsteps."

Distributes a Proclamation

Mr. Gavan declared that Tom Milionika, arrested on a deportation warrant, which was later cancelled by Assistant Secretary of Labor Post, had been found in Chicago distributing the May Day proclamation of the Communist party.
