questions to show the absolute fallacy of Admiral Sims' claims," Mr. Daniels said. "He informed the committee that the net tonnage available for the allies May 1, 1917, was 27,000,,000 tons. It is a matter of common knowledge that on May 7, 1918, the tonnage was less than on May 1, 1917. Testimony given by Admiral Sims would indicate that the net loss during the year was about 2, 000,000 tons. This is probably a sufficiently close estimate for practical pur poses. Now, then, owing to the tonnag onses of 1917 and the early part of 1918 the net tonnage available to the allies had been reduced from 27,000,000 May 1, 1917, to 25,,000,000 on May 1. Yet it is admitted by Admiral Sims, that in the spring of 1918, American troops were transported to France at the rate of nearly 300,000 a month, or more than ten times the rate to which he said transportation had been re-stricted in 1917 because of the destruction of tonnage. This simple fact re-futes absolutely Admiral Sims' state ment that the townage losses of 1917 made it 'impossible to transport any considerable American army' and made it 'necessary to limit the number of American troops that could be sent abroad during the first year to an average of approximately 25,,000 men per month.

There never was a time, the witness said, when tonnage was not available to carry rtoops and supplies to France as fast as they could be landed and rtansported to the front, although it was "only by extreme exertions that this was lone during the rush of troops in April." Allocation of ships to the United States by the allies was always the dominant factor, Mr. Daniels declared. Army Shortened War.

"As a matter of fact the American army materially shortened the war," said Secretary Daniels. "It got to the front as soon as it was humanly possible, not by chance, but as a result of careful plans involving complete co-operation between the army and navy, carefully Mr. Daniels quoted Field Marshal
