RICHMOND SHOWS LESS INCREASES IN H. C. L.

Washington, May 14.—Changes in the cost of living in 13 industrial centers in the United States from December, 1917, to December, 1919, made public today by the Bureau of Labor statistics of the Department of Labor, show the largest increase registered in Denver, Col., with 38.19 per cent.

The next eleven cities showed increases as follows: Kansas City, Mo., 38.16; Atlanta, Ga., 37.89; Scranton, Pa., 37.10; Indianapolis, 36.53; Pittsburgh, 36.17; Cincinnati, 35.24; Memphis, 35.23; Birmingham, 34.32; St. Louis, 34.24; New Orleans, 33.86.

BANDIT SPENDS EVENTFUL HOUR BEFORE HIS DEATH

Chicago, Ill., May 14.—In four hours today, Horace T. Walton, 22 years old, of St. Louis, Meisoshahill, a resident of St. Joseph, Mo., robbed a train, stole \$75,000 in cash, killed a policeman, barricaded himself in his apartment, held 50 detectives at bay in a pistol battle in which one was seriously wounded, and died with a bullet in his heart.

Walton held up the mail car of the New Orleans Limited on the Illinois Central railroad late last night as the train was leaving Kankakee, Ill. He boarded the train at Gilman, a few miles from Kankakee, held up five clerks in the mail car, rifled the car and left the train at the first stop in Chicago.

Two policemen questioned him, he opened fire, wounding Patrolman Wm. A. Roberts, who died later at a hospital. He was finally surrounded at his rooming place and was killed in the fight that followed.

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lion American soldiers in France by March, 1918, the war would have ended four months sooner, Mr. Daniels said, and completed the reasoning by assuming that the tonnage losses of 1917 prevented carrying the number of troops across by that date and that failure of the American navy to cooperate heartily in the first months of the war resulted in the heavy tonnage losses.

Sims Versus Facts

"It is not necessary to wander far into the realms of statistics or technical questions to show the absolute fallacy of Admiral Sims' claims," Mr. Daniels said. "He informed the committee that the net tonnage available for the allies May 1, 1917, was 27,000,000 tons. It is a matter of common knowledge that on May 1, 1918, the tonnage was less than on May 1, 1917. Testimony given by Admiral Sims would indicate that the net loss during the year was about 2,000,000 tons. This is probably a sufficiently close estimate for practical purposes. Now, then, owing to the tonnage losses of 1917 and the early part of 1918, the net tonnage available to the allies had been reduced from 27,000,000 on May 1, 1917, to 25,000,000 on May 1, 1918. Yet it is admitted by Admiral Sims, that in the spring of 1918, American troops were transported to France at the rate of nearly 300,000 a month, or more than ten times the rate to which he said transportation had been restricted in 1917 because of the destruction of tonnage. This simple fact refutes absolutely Admiral Sims' statement that the tonnage losses of 1917 made it 'impossible to transport any considerable American army' and made it 'necessary to limit the number of American troops that could be sent abroad during the first year to an average of approximately 25,000 men per month.'"

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Halg as saying that the British armies were unable to intervene until nearly two years had elapsed in sufficient strength adequately to assist the allies. The war was over 19 months after the United States entered, he said, adding that "on one can deny that within 15 months after our entry the American army was in sufficient strength 'adequately to assist the allies.'"
