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PRESIDENT VEToes ELEVEN MEASURES

Resolution Repealing Wartime Laws Included; Fifty-eight Measures Approved

Washington, June 5.—Eleven bills and resolutions passed by Congress in the closing days of its session, including the Water Power measure, and the joint resolution repealing most of the wartime laws and proclamations, were killed today by President Wilson through a "pocket veto."

The President explained that the measure which died with the adjournment of Congress without his signature did not reach him in time for his proper consideration.

The Naval Appropriation bill carrying \$436,000,000. The Army Appropriation bill carrying \$394,000,000. The Sundry Civil bill carrying \$436,000,000.

The Industrial Vocational Rehabilitation bill. The Merchant Marine bill. The Postoffice Pay Increase bill.

An act to establish a woman's bureau in the Department of Labor. An act granting pensions and increases of pensions to certain sailors and soldiers of wars other than the Civil War and widows and dependent relatives of such persons.

New York, June 5.—Hanna Kolchmann, of Brooklyn, triple winner in the Olympic games at Stockholm, won the 26 1/2 mile marathon race run today at Travers Island, under the auspices of the New York Athletic Club, in which long distance runners from principal cities east of Chicago competed.

NEWPORT NEWS, VA., HAS POPULATION OF 35,396. Washington, June 5.—Newport News, Va., which ranked as forty-fourth city of the South and 279th city of the nation in 1910, with 30,925 people, now has a population of 35,396. The increase in the last decade was 15,391, or 76.3 per cent. It now ranks among the cities of the South whose population thus far have been announced, just below Columbia, S. C., and just above Wilmington, N. C.

REPRESENTATION OF SOUTH TO BE CUT

Republicans Not Satisfied With Way Things Are Going In Southern States

Chicago, Ill., June 5.—Representation of the Southern states in future national conventions would further be reduced under plans to be urged upon the National committee.

Many of the northern committeemen are convinced that the issue reduction did not reach the mark, at which the committee was aiming and they etc the crop of delegate contests brought to the National committee from the Southern States, with accompanying "cooked up evidence," packed or secret conventions, and stacks of affidavits which some delegates before the committee charged had been obtained at "five dollars a throw."

The plan is to give the states representation by a limited number of delegates at large and to put the required number of Republican votes in the Congressional districts at a mark which will reduce the district delegate representation.

New York, June 5.—Thirteen Russians, signed on as officers and members of the crew of the American steamship John Lind, which arrived here today from Copenhagen, are reported to be either escaped members of the official family of the former emperor of Russia, Nicholas Romanoff, or former high officials of the Russian Navy.

CUBAN SCHOONER LOADED WITH COGNAC CAPTURED. Tampa, Fla., June 5.—With 11,000 quarts of cognac concealed in the cabin and elsewhere, the Cuban schooner Yabal was captured Friday off Sanibel Island, 100 miles south of here, by the coast guard sub-chaser, Yaughan, towed to Tampa today and turned over to customs officers. Two of the crew were seized in the charge of smuggling, but the captain and the other four members of the crew were ashore and escaped when the schooner was captured.

LIDA SPRULL IS AGAIN AT LIBERTY

Girl Who Caused Sensation Two Years Ago Escapes From Hospital

After two years' peaceful and un-sensational residence at the State Hospital for the Insane, Lida Sprull has again taken leave of her keepers, making her escape from the institution some time during the night Friday.

The young woman was the center of a sensation two years ago that threatened to involve the officials of the Caswell Training School in an investigation of the conduct of the school.

GASOLINE STOCKS GROW; CRUDE OIL DECREASES. Washington, June 5.—While stocks of gasoline at the end of March were 80,000,000 gallons, or 14 per cent. greater than on the same date last year, the amount of crude oil in storage showed a decrease of 3,385,000 barrels, it was announced today by the Bureau of Mines.
