Expected Higher Quotations Over The Week-end Failed To Materialize

New York, June 14.- The course of today's stock market was distinctly disappointing to those who had hoped that developments over the week-end would find expression in higher quotations. Trading after the steady opening was almost steadily downward on professional pressure.

Nothing in the day's operations suggested even a slight revival of public interest as a result of the deliberations of the Republican National Convention nor did the better weekly reports of the Federal Reserve bank and the clearing house cause any change of sentiment. Opinion was divided regarding latest political aspects, but Wall Street seemed vastly more interested in prospective dividend announcements. Meetings of several of the important rail-road and industrial road and industrial companies soon to be held were the subject of much conjecture.

Money continued firm, as was to be expected in view of tomorrow's heavy income tax payments. Call loans opened at eight per cent, last Friday's renewal rate, easing later to 7 per cent. There was no increase of time funds, but conservative opinion inclined to the belief that rates would ease by the end of the month.

Gains in western tonnage followed improvement in freight conditions, but business at leading terminals in the west and southwest continued to wait on relaxation of credits. Interior banks were reported to be renewing many cans maturing at the mid-year. Somewhat in the order named, oils,

especially the Mexican group, equipments, motors, independent steels, tobaccos, miscellaneous specialties were the outstanding features of the day's general reaction. Dividend paying rails, especially trans-continental, extended

Aggressive Selling Sends Values Down To Lowest Since Government Report

New York, June 14 .- With continued good weather in the South and the stock market showing an easier tone, selling became more general and aggressive in became more general and aggressive in the cotton market today. Prices broke to lower levels than any touched previously since the publication of the government report at the beginning of the month, with October selling at 34.87, or 76 points below the closing price of Saturday. Last prices were approximately the lowest of the day, with the market barely steady at a net decline of 43 to 88 points.

The market opened steady at an advance of four points to a decline of teu points, with near nonths relatively steady. July sold up to 38.54 right after the call on buying against spinners'

the call on buying against spinners' calling and there was also a little trade demand for early new crop deliveries. Otherwise, however, support was lacking and early buyers were soon supplied, with the selling becoming more active after the publication of favorable weather forecasts and the detailed

weather forecasts and the detailed weather reports.

Stop orders were incovered as the market broke through the low levels of last Wednesday, with July selling down to 37.98 in the late trading, or 45 points net lower while new crop positions showed net losses of 76 to 88 points with December selling at 33.77. There was a good deal of Southern selling on the decline particularly for New Orleans account and Liverpool was an early seller, while there was considerable. seller, while there was considerable pressure from Wall Street and local sources. The report f the Census Bu-reau showing domestic consumption of 541,080 bales for May was slightly below the forecast, but compared bullishly with last year's report of 487,034 bales and had little immediate influence.
