

ENTHUSIASM MARKS OPENING OF DRIVE

Workers Lay Plans For Raising \$100,000 For Rex Hospital

ACTIVE CAMPAIGNING WILL BEGIN AT NOON

Final Directions Given 200 Men and Women Who Will Have Work in Hand; Speeches By Mayor Eldridge, Dr. D. H. Hill, Mr. Claude Barbee and Others

The following subscriptions to the Rex Hospital fund were announced at last night's opening dinner of the \$100,000 campaign in the City Auditorium as coming from or through the executive committee of the campaign organization:

Gratifying enthusiasm marked the opening of the \$100,000 fund campaign for the rehabilitation and enlargement of Rex Hospital at a banquet held in the City Auditorium with more than 200 workers in attendance.

Actual work of solicitation will begin today, and continue for 10 days, although none of the speakers were willing to admit of the belief that more than two days would be necessary to put the fund well beyond the goal.

A heavy rainstorm that broke a few minutes before the hour set for the beginning of the dinner did not serve to keep away many, and almost every seat and the score of tables were taken.

Mr. Barbee Speaks. Mr. Claude Barbee was the first speaker presented and he insisted that he was put on because he was a brief speaker, laughingly telling his audience that he was told to tell all he knew and for the rest of the 10 minutes allowed him to speak to do the best he could.

"The hospital is doing a magnificent work," he continued, "but it is not getting the thing done. So far this year they have turned away more than 200 patients."

Dr. D. H. Hill, former president of State College, was introduced as a "man who would not be here to speak for us if it had not been for Rex Hospital."

"We ought to help the hospital because it has been criticized," he declared, saying that nobody ever got criticized unless it had been doing something in some direction.

"We ought to help the hospital because it is ours; we ought to help it because it needs us, and we ought to help it because we need it here," he went on.

Wendell Will Help. Mayor Eldridge spoke briefly, promising his fullest co-operation and expressing his hope that the drive would be crowned with the largest measure of success.

Frederick Courtney Barber, of New York City, who is here to assist in the drive, then spoke briefly, outlining the technical details of the campaign, explaining to the workers how the names of prospective subscribers would be listed, and the methods that would be used in approaching the donors.

CONVENTION DELEGATES INSPECT BUNCOMBE ROADS

Highway Enthusiasts Find Asheville Roads To Be Best In North Carolina

Asheville, June 18.—Although no business sessions were held today by the North Carolina Good Roads Association, practically all of the delegates who did not leave last night or early this morning for their homes, were taken on several automobile trips over the Buncombe county roads.

Under the guidance of the three county commissioners, E. A. Patton, Otto Israel and G. F. Stradley, and some of the highway engineers from the local office, the delegates were taken over the Black Mountain road as far as Asaulla, over the Hendersonville concrete road as far as the Hendersonville county line, over the Asheville-Charlotte-Wilmington highway as far as Mine-holeway, and the Weaverville asphalt road for a distance of sixteen miles and over the Asheville-Murphy Atlanta-highway to Acton and back through the Asheville school.
