

DURHAM POLICE MAY QUIT POSTS

Not Striking But Say Present Salaries Don't Meet Living Expenses

Durham, June 30.—It is possible that Durham may find herself without police protection during the ensuing week. The 19 members of the force, who recently signed a "round robin" petition that their request for an increase of \$95 per month will be included in the city's next budget, intimates that they will stick to their original decision and leave their posts July 1 unless assurances are given. The city administrators are not expected to meet until Thursday night, the date when the signers of the petition are to quit. The police say they do maintain an attitude of "striking" that the petition speaks for itself. "They don't feel that they are not making enough money to pay actual expenses. The matter right now is in a state of uncertainty as to what the aldermen will do."

Kramer Tobacco Company, will become associated with the Golden Belt Manufacturing Company and will assume his duties with that company on the first of August. He is looked upon as a valuable asset to the company.

Mr. J. W. Phillips, who was for a number of years freight agent for the Southern Railway at Raleigh and who left here about four months ago to take a position with the Southern at Salisbury where his parents live, died Monday night of heart trouble in a Washington, D. C., hospital where he was taken for treatment of a broken leg which he sustained in a fall about two weeks ago. Mr. Phillips was an active and prominent Mason, being a member of the Scottish Rite bodies in Raleigh, a Shriner, and a member of Sudan Temple, and a director of the Raleigh Shrine Club.

He was 39 years old. Both of his parents are living. His wife died in Raleigh about a year ago, and it is said that grief over her death tended to aggravate his sickness. The funeral will be held from the home of his parents on Banks street in Salisbury this afternoon.
