FIGHT FOR HEALTH

Straus Tells Conference of Food Kitchen and Anti-Disease Efforts

London, July 5.—Nathan Straus New York told the International Zion-ist Conference here today that the Straus health bureau in Palestine had supplied a need that had been ignored for hundreds of years by a "criminally indifferent government" and that it had become a "stronghold in the life had become a "stronghold in the life of the Holy Land." The bureau was astablished by Mr. Straus in 1912.

The only problem which took precedings of the health question was the feeding of the hungry for which he paid he established a free soup kitchen in Jerusalem which up to now, has been feeding 700 to 1,000 persons daily. Members of committees returning from Palestine, he said, had told him that his soup kitchen was "the brightest spot in the Hely City." The health bureau, Mr. Strus said, was established to improve

The health bureau, Mr. Strus said, was established to improve health conditions generally and partibularly to eradicate malaria and trechoma, the two diseases which were endemic there. It was intended to serve all inhabitants of Palestine irrespective of creed, race or calor and, since the Jews number less than encesisth of the total population, its work had accrued largely to the benefit of non-lews.

Mr. Straus reviewed the fight conducted against malaria by the Health bureau in and around Jerusalem in 1916 and 1917, which he said "nipped the cholora epidemic in the hud." Clinics were aponed in five districts and injections of anti-malaria lymph were given to all comers, while school children were insculated by nurses sent by the health hureau into districts. In all 30,750 persons were given preventive injections against cholora. Typhus lymph also was prepared and administered.

More than \$8,000 persons were examined to assertain if they were affected with malaria and where the reaction was positive, quining was given free ef cost. The water in elsterns used for drinking purposes was examined and a museum of hygiens was established. In combatting trachoma, Mr. Straus said, the health bureau treated \$41,874 cases and an attempt was made to examine the gyes of all children who could be reached so as to identify that fiscase which was prevalent in Pales-

A hospital for eye diseases was opened and the campaign was extended into the towns and colonies outside ed into the towns and colonies outside of Jerusalom, nurses being sent to various places. Aid was also given to refugees when the Jewish population was expelled from Jaffa. Mr. Straus said that the health bureau had proved its efficacy and that he hoped its services would increase and become greater in the rehabilitation of the Holy Land, a blessing to the people irrespective of race, color or religion.

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
