

# CAPITALS SWAMP HIGH POINT, 6 TO 0

### The Locals Come Back Strong, Fielding Faultlessly and Hitting Hard

Playing a perfect fielding game behind the effective pitching of Hughes and supporting the visiting pitchers hard, the Capitals came back strong yesterday and completely swamped High Point by the score of 6 to 0.

The locals went in with a rush, scoring four runs in the first inning and hitting completely around, with only Geer and Hughes failing to secure hits. One run was lost by Duray taking a justifiable risk in attempting to go from first to third on Hott's short single to right field. Lennox later got away with the same play on a much narrower margin.

The work of Hughes stood in marked contrast to that of Snyder. The former allowed only five widely scattered hits during the entire game, while each of the five men who faced Snyder hit safely. The feat gives Hughes two consecutive shut-outs, the first having been the 1 to 0 game with Durham last Thursday.

The record shows that five runs were scored against High and that he allowed seven hits in a fraction less than eight innings, but when it is remembered that Monday he pitched a 17-inning game against Durham and in view of the fact that he entered the game yesterday without warming up and with the bases full, the local club may well be thankful that he was not saved for today.

McNeill was by all odds the outstanding figure of the game, the hard-working guardian of the hot corner hitting safely on each of his four trips to the plate. McNeill's hitting has been steadily improving as the season has advanced and a few more weeks of the same sort of work will put him in the coveted 300 class.

Heffer also batted out two timely swats, demonstrating that his recent improvement with the stick has not been at all accidental. Lennox also connected twice and every other member of the club except Geer and Hughes got at least one. However, Geer batted in two of the six runs.

The game was the first played on the local lot this season in which not a single base on balls was issued, but it was not peculiar in that respect alone. The only error, a base hit recorded (a triple by Partain, who has transferred from the Twins) was a Huke, Dorsey, falling in attempting to field the ball. Moreover, the only sacrifice hit would have been under the old classification a sacrifice fly and there was not a single stolen base. Then, too, the only two errors of the game were muffs of ridiculously easy chances, and both were contributed by exceptionally good ball players—Conley letting one fall and Walston dropping the other.

An error, a hit and a sacrifice gave the Capitals their fifth run in the fifth inning and in the seventh an error and two hits netted the final tally.
