Zoglin and Max Rosengarten were yesterday tried for conspiracy to assault Max Bane, a well known local junk dealer and a competitor of the indicted Jews. The retorts of Bane to the ques-tions saked him on cross examination kept the large crowd in a continuous hept the large crowd in a continuous uproar, the witness successfully evading all efforts of Attorney W. F. Evans to show that Bane has a shady record. Bane admitted he had been in court a number of times but showed a clean slate in each instance.

Each side was represented by an array of counsel, but argument was cut off by the court directing a verdict of guilty against Alex Weinstein and Max

guilty sgainst Alex Weinstein and Max Rosengarten and a verdict of not guilty in respect to the other two. The alleged conspiracy culminated in Bane being called out of the Bland hotel on June 12, but only discussion resulted from the

meeting.

Judgment was suspended on pament of costs in the case of A. D. Andruss, charged with assault with a deadly weapon and exceeding the speed limit, with charges having grown out of his having run over Charlie Nixon, an inmate of the County Home on Glenwood

The defendant was ordered to appear in court at the next January and July show that he has not been guilty of violating the automobile laws. Judge Kerr stated to Andruss that he would have punished him but for the fact that he had himself suffered serlous injury as a result of the seci-dent. He held Andruss blameless for the incident except in that he was driving at an excessive rate of speed.
At the conclusion of the State's evi-

dence, the defendant submitted a plea of guilty. It developed that at the time of the accident Andruss was testing out a high powered car owned by Mrs. Brodie Duke of Durham.

C., July 14.—Virginia mployers of children under 14 years of age must pay the Federal tax of 10 per cent on the annual profits of their business despite the more lenient provisions of the state child labor law, which permit 12-year-old children to work in canneries when school is not

The Bureau of Internal Revenue in announcing tonight that the state law affords no protection from the Federal tax also said that the Federal Governmen would not accept state employme it certificates to establish age. Employers are cautioned to keep on file Federal certificates for all children on their payrolls for the inspection of Federal

The Federal tax is collectable, it was pointed out, wherever children under 14 years of age are employed at any time, or those between 14 and 16 are permit ted to work after 7 p. m.

Leaders of National Woman's Party Preparing For Vigorous Campaign

Washington, D. C., July 14 .- National suffrage workers, including lobbyists, personal workers, financial agents and press agents, boarded outgoing trains tonight for Tennessee and North Care lina to begin the intensive drive for ratification by the thirty-sixth state. Just before the departure of the militant wing of the suffrage forces a statement was issued from headquarters here expressing full confidence in the out-come in both Democratic states, and announcing a generous response to the S. O. S. for another \$10,000 campaign fund recently sent broadcast. That, it was said, will be spent in Tennessee, and a like amount will be needed for organization purposes in North Caro-lina. Contributors announced included folks in all walks of life from United States Senators to taxi drivers, and the sums coming in ranged in size from dollar bills to checks for a thousand. Reports from the White House today were to the effect that Senstor Furnifold M. Simmons had as yet made no response to the President's recent mesresponse to the President's recent mes-sage urging ratification. Senator Lee Slater Overman, it' was said today, has responded, but in a decidedly negative way. His wire to the President in response to the chief executive's re-quest that he use his influence now in behalf of the Democratic party was
