

SUPERIOR COURT ALMOST CLEARED

Judge Kerr Disposes of Cases Rapidly and Clears Way For Adjournment

Disposing of a number of cases and continuing a number of others Judge John H. Kerr yesterday tore big holes in the criminal docket of Wake county Superior Court and cleared the way for adjournment today.

Each side was represented by an array of counsel, but argument was cut off by the court directing a verdict of guilty against Alex Weinstein and Max Rosengarten and a verdict of not guilty in respect to the other two.

The defendant in the case of A. D. Andrus, charged with assault with a deadly weapon and exceeding the speed limit, with charges having grown out of his having run over Charlie Nixon, an inmate of the County Home on Glenwood avenue, March 8, last.

The call was issued by Governor Bickett yesterday.

TO RESUME TRADING IN WHEAT FUTURES TODAY

Chicago, July 14.—Restrictions on future delivery business in wheat, which have been in existence as a war rule since August 25, 1917, will expire tomorrow. The big gang of the Chicago Board of Trade will sound at 9:30 a.m. and will be answered by an ear-splitting yell from hundreds of brokers and the war rule will instantly cease to operate here and at other grain trading centers in the United States.

VIRGINIA EMPLOYERS OF CHILDREN MUST PAY TAX

Washington, D. C., July 14.—Virginia employers of children under 14 years of age must pay the Federal tax of 10 per cent on the annual profits of their business despite the more lenient provisions of the state child labor law, which permit 12-year-old children to work in canneries when school is not in session.

LOFTIN HELD AS SUSPECT IN MURDER OF NEGRO BOY

Durham, July 14.—James Loftin, a young white man, paroled July 1 by Governor Bickett after he had served six months of a two years' sentence at the county work house for an assault on his wife with a knife, was arrested tonight and held as a suspect in connection with the murder late this afternoon of Joseph Robertson, a five year old negro boy. Officers say the evidence against Loftin is circumstantial.

SUFFRAGISTS TO INVAD CAROLINA

Leaders of National Woman's Party Preparing For Vigorous Campaign

Washington, D. C., July 14.—National suffrage workers, including lobbyists, personal workers, financial agents and press agents, boarded outgoing trains tonight for Tennessee and North Carolina to begin the intensive drive for ratification by the thirty-sixth state. Just before the departure of the militant wing of the suffrage forces a statement was issued from headquarters here expressing full confidence in the outcome in both Democratic states, and announcing a generous response to the S. O. S. for another \$10,000 campaign fund recently sent broadcast. That, it was said, will be spent in Tennessee, and a like amount will be needed for organization purposes in North Carolina. Contributors announced included folks in all walks of life from United States Senators to taxi drivers, and the sums coming in ranged in size from dollar bills to checks for a thousand.

STATE'S FIRE LOSS IN JUNE \$360,000

Fire losses in North Carolina during the month of June total only \$360,000, according to a bulletin issued yesterday by the State Insurance Department, distributed among three configurations, which include the burning of a motor plant in Hickory, the James Walker Memorial Hospital in Wilmington, and the fire at Chapel Hill. An allowance of \$19,000 is made to cover small miscellaneous fires not included in the reports.
