William Kinnam Vanderbilt, son of iam H., and grandson of Commodore Vanderbilt, one of the most promi-ment railroad executives, financiers and sportamen in the United States, passed much of his time in recent years abroad. The Duke of Mariborough married ais

Mr. Vanderbilt was long a patron of the French turf, of yachting and of automobile racing in the Upited States.

Besides having built the Alva, which was sunk, and the Valiant, steam yachts, he was a member of sev-eral syndicates organized to build de-

During the war, Mr. Vanderbilt was
active in hospital work and relief abroad and in promoting the work of the La-fayette Escadrille. On one occasion he ontributed \$40,000 to the Neuilly hesital fund and at another time gave 1,000,000 lire toward war relief in Italy. Because of his work for the ican aviators in France he was made honorary president of the Lafay-ette Escadrille and presented with the rosette of the Legion of Honor. During the summer of 1919 Mr. Vanderbilt was reported to have presented to his daughter, the Duchess of Marlborough,

Mr. Vanderbilt was born on Staten Island, N. Y., December 12, 1894. After receiving an academic education in America he studied for several years in Geneva, Switzerland. He married Miss Alva Smith, of Mobile, Ala., (now Mrs. Alva Smith, of Mobile, Ala., (now Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont), in 1874, and to them were born, beside Consuelo, two other children, William K., Jr., and Harold Vanderbilt. On April 23, 1903, Mr. Vanderbilt married Mrs. A. H. Butherford in London, England.

Upon completing his studies switzerland, he entered the office of C. C. Clarke, treasurer of the Hudson River Bailroad, first as a bookkeeper, and was gradually placed in positions of trust and responsibility in connection with the great Vanderbilt railroad sys-tem. From 1877 to 1833 he was second vice-president of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad. He was also chairman of the board of directors of the Lake Shore & Michigan Southers. Railway for many years, as well as a director of the New York Central, Central, Lake Erie and Chicago & Northwestern, Milwaukee and St. Paul, Cleveland, Cincinnati and St. New York and Harlem, Pittsburgh and Lake Erie and West Shore oads. He was also a director of the Metropolitan Opera Company and united with his brothers, Cornelius, George and Frederick, in establishing derbilt clinic in New York at a cost of more than \$500,000. His sons, William K., Jr., and Harold Vanderbilt, are directors in more than 150 railroad and other corporations.
