

COMMITTEE WILL GET VOTERS OUT

Intensive Campaign Tomorrow To Carry School Tax Election Through

FINAL CONFERENCE AT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Women's Committees Under Direction of Mrs. J. W. Dunn Will Get Nearly 800 Women To The Polls; Rotary, Kiwanis, American Legion and Chamber Co-operating

The special school tax committee composed of representatives from the Rotary Club, the Kiwanis Club, the American Legion and the Chamber of Commerce, with Mr. Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., as chairman came together yesterday afternoon for its final meeting before the election tomorrow to complete its plans of organization for securing the special tax. This committee though it will exercise general supervision, is depending largely upon the organizations already formed among the women for carrying and conducting it.

The chairman then announced committees for each precinct who are to spend the day at the polling places and from contributions with a list of those registered in each precinct, which Capt. Harry Howell has secured, to discover who has not voted, and then to proceed forthwith to see that they do. Each committee is to provide itself with as many automobiles as possible in which to fetch the wandering voter to the polls, should he appear forgetful of his obligations.

FREMONT NEGRO MISSING AFTER BEING LOCKED UP

After Exciting Chase Taken Into Custody For Looking Into Room

Fremont, Sept. 30.—After an exciting chase here last night, Norman Artis, colored, was run down and captured by two white men, who caught the negro in the act of looking through the blinds into the room of a young white woman who was retiring for the night. The father of the young woman was one of the party who captured the negro who before being turned over to the Chief of Police, J. M. Cobb, and locked up was severely beaten by the angry parent.

It is believed that Artis is the same party who has on several other occasions frightened the young white woman by rattling the slats in the blinds of her bed room but when she gave an alarm succeeded in making his escape.

FLLOUR MILL DESTROYED BY EARLY MORNING FIRE

Winston-Salem, Sept. 30.—The modern two hundred barrels flour mills of Rose and Ogburn at Walkertown was destroyed by fire at a late hour last night, entailing a loss of sixty thousand dollars, practically covered by insurance. The mill was put in operation only last Spring and the owners had built up a large patronage. The fire originated on an upper floor of the building, which was a frame structure.

BARBECUE DINNER FEATURES PICNIC

Rowland Prepared Bountiful Supply of Food For Divisionists But It Rained

Rowland, Sept. 30.—In spite of the continuously falling rain, around three thousand people gathered here today, the occasion being the fourth picnic and barbecue in the territory of the proposed counties of Liberty and LaFayette. The people of this enterprising and progressive town had made provision for ten thousand enthusiastic new county advocates and the rainy day caused great disappointment.

One street block had been fenced in and a table running throughout its length erected. Thirty-four booths were set up to a turn last night, sixteen hundred chickens and five hundred pounds of ham cooked, together with mountains of pies and delicious cake, which made up a spread fit for the gods.

These barbecues began at St. Pauls and have been held at Rod Springs, Maston and Rowland, in the interest of division of the big county of Robeson. The picnics held here have been these districts and the next will be held at Rod Springs, furnished by the whole assembly on October 25. After the dinner here today a meeting was held in the new hotel lobby to further the interest of division and a fund from Liberty and LaFayette to the national campaign, amounting to one thousand dollars, was guaranteed.

every set by seeking to delimit his authority and to enlarge, not that of Congress, but that of the Senate cabal. Upon his return to America, he invited the Senate to review the work he had accomplished informally. No great word was made about that. It was rather cordially received, but it so overshadowed the ambition of certain parties and Senators that they determined to bind it with "new cords" of reservations until it looked like a corpse rather than a covenant. By the craft of politics these silver-smiths, who are 'getting the money' for the Republican campaign fund, have their wealth. They pitched their campaign, from the round robin sent to Paris to the latest fetish of an International Court, upon the plans first of Shufte and Scuttle and, then of Nihilistic Vagueness.

The Republican politicians knew that upon domestic issues they were doomed to defeat. The record of eight years at home, in peace and war, is unassailable. It was only upon international questions, Alberto not issues in campaign, they hoped to create a division, and secure such widespread doubt and division as to restore them to power. Therefore they have misrepresented the Covenant of Peace by saying it meant war when its every sentence breathes peace, have made an unprincipled appeal to every un-American

hypocrite in the country, and lost the top-ton of isolation and blind nationalism until in the dim and noise they hope the people cannot pay heed to the clear and imminent will of national duty and national hope. They insult the intelligence of the American people by insisting and reiterating that their only course should be for their own welfare, and some of them so little understand the excellence and ease of world responsibility of their own countrymen as to say 'Let Europe stew in its juices. Let us take care of ourselves.'
