MILLS BOYS MAY GO TO REFORMATORY NOW

Walter and Marvin Mills Charged With Murder, Are Released From Jail

Walter and Marvin Mills, young boys of twelve and ten, who were airrested last Wednesday on a charge of murder by shooting Rufus Talton, were given a hearing in Superior Court yesterday and the indiotment questhed under a ruling handed down by Supreme Court which forbids a person under sixteen being arraigned for murder. The two boys were turned over to R. K. Childress, Supertendent of Public Welfare, Wake County, and are now on probation pending what disposition can be made of them. They were removed from the juil yesterday morning on a writ of habeas corpus, issued by Judge J. H. Kerr on request Armstead Jones and Son, attorneys for the boys. The shooting for which the boys were indicted occurred last September and it was thought at the time to have been accidental. The Talton boy was shot through the abdomen and died after being at Rex hospital for some time. Macon, Ga., Oct. 28 .- Indictments charging conspiracy to purloin and embezzle property of the United Stace, conspiracy to embezzle interstate express shipments and couspiracy to defraud the United States were returned by the Pederal grand jurp here today against sixty-four express measengers, express agents, railroad conductors and others.

The American Railway Express com-pany presented evidence to the grand jury showing that for the first six mentls of this year property stora from the express company in couthern States amounted to \$1,018,723.94.
The articles alleged to have been stolen range from furs, silk shirts, pocket knives and gone to hogs, chickone, fish and eggs.
