

CAROLINA ALL SET FOR HARD TUSSLE

New Line-Up Will Face Speedy V. M. I. Cadets This Afternoon

Chapel Hill, Nov. 5.—Members of the Carolina football squad are set for what they consider will be their hardest fight of the year, the game with the flying cadets from Virginia Military Institute here Saturday. A week of careful coaching with most of the cripples of the past three weeks back in harness has brought the team to a more finished condition than at any time this year and a steady under-current of feeling has swept across the campus that the Tar Heels will spring more in this game than they have shown yet.

The return of Lowe, Tenney, and Spauld to the backfield has put more life into the team, and with the brilliant young McDonald to guide, this backfield, Carolina supporters are looking for a more powerful offensive than has been shown in other games. The line is working smoother with the shift of Hanby back to tackle, his original position, and the change of Pritchard from tackle to guard; and the only doubtful positions now are the ends. With an especially heavy attack expected to be thrown against his ends from the speedy V. M. I. backs led by Captain Leech, Fuller has put two heavy men on his wings, Morris and Griffith, who have been coached to break up the interference which is every game they have played this year has been a feature of the cadets' play. Both weigh around 175 and both have received this week a lot of individual coaching from Fuller, Hite, and Yank Tandy, 1915 captain, who has been with the squad all week. Cochran, Crayton, and Lippert, all experienced ends, will be held in reserve.

The full Tar Heel line-up will be with Morris and Griffith at ends; Captain Harrell and Hanby at tackles; Poindester and Pritchard at guards; Jacobl at center; McDonald at quarter; and Lowe, Tenney, and either Spauld or Hutchins in the backfield. Both of the latter will probably be used, though Hutchins is not in good shape. Preparations have been made to take care of the largest home crowd of the season. Many alumni have written that they were coming. University students are giving a dance Saturday night and the visiting girls will add color and gaiety to the game.

WAKE FOREST TO PLAY ELON TODAY

Game Will End Baptists' Home Season; Two Games For Next Week

Wake Forest, Nov. 5.—Wake Forest plays the second game of the football season to be staged on the home ground tomorrow when the old gold and black eleven meets Elon College.

Tomorrow's event is expected to serve well to bring out the weak spots in the line up before the game next week with the University of Richmond. Elon is reported to have a considerably stronger team now than last year or even at the beginning of this season and in all probability will give Wake Forest a good fight tomorrow.

During the past five days Coach White has been putting his squad through some strenuous training both in signal running, new formations, and scrimmaging and the team appears to be in about the best condition of the year.

Next Thursday Wake Forest meets the Naval Air Station of Norfolk at Scotland Neck as an Armistice Day Celebration. From Scotland Neck the team journeys to Richmond where it will play the University of Richmond. Between these games and the concluding event of the season with North Carolina State there remains one game with Sewanee at Norfolk, Virginia, scheduled for November 20.

Tomorrow's line-up will be picked from Heckman, Johnston, Taylor ends; Moss Provat, and Blackhear tackles; Bundy, Martin, Batman, and Westerhoff guards; and Wall center. The back field will be selected from Babcock, Fulton, Johnson, Jennette, Armstrong, Boylin, and Benton.

PUGILISTS SIGN CONTRACT FOR BOUT

Dempsey and Carpenter Will Be Well Paid For Boxing Match

New York, Nov. 5.—Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier signed a contract here today to fight for the world's heavyweight championship for a half million dollar purse. The date and place of the contest is not specifically stated in the agreement, but in other respects the contract is complete and definite.

Dempsey is to receive \$300,000 for defending the title. Carpentier, who holds the European heavyweight championship will receive \$200,000 as his share of the purse. Each fighter in addition is to hold twenty-five per cent of the moving picture apparatus stock while the other fifty per cent goes to the three joint promoters, Tex Rickard, Charles Cochran and William A. Brady. The \$500,000 purse is to be deposited with a bank or trust company, located near the scene of the battle, at least 24 hours previous to the contest and will be divided between the principals immediately after the termination of the fight.

Each pugilist, through his manager, must post a \$50,000 forfeit on or before November 20, to be divided equally between his prospective opponent and the promoters, if he fails to keep his part of the contract. The promoters also agreed to deposit \$100,000 on or before the same date, to be divided equally between the pugilists should the promoters fail to carry out their part of the contract. The contract also calls for a contest ranging from 16 to 15 rounds to be held at a place to be selected later, either in the United States, Canada, Mexico or Cuba.

The parties to the contract submitted are Robert Edgerton, William Brown and James J. Corbett, of New York; James J. Jeffries, of Los Angeles; Otto Plotz of Kansas City and James F. Daugherty, of Philadelphia.

There was little formality or ostentation in the signing of the contract, the terms of which have been generally known and agreed upon for some days. All the contracting parties gathered at an uptown hotel and in the presence of a large number of newspaper men, quickly signed the contract with which all were apparently thoroughly familiar. The actual affixing of signatures did not take more than five minutes, after which principals and promoters adjourned to the roof for the usual motion picture stand.

While there is an apparent air of mystery and uncertainty surrounding the time and place of the battle, it is generally accepted that unless there is stern opposition from the New York State boxing commission the bout will be held in a special open air arena to be erected within or very close to the city limits of New York. The date for such a contest will be between the middle of June and the fourth of July. In case the bout cannot be held in New York state for any reason it probably will be shifted to New Jersey, Cuba, Mexico and Canada are not be-

WILLIAM & MARY PLAY HERE TODAY

State College Expects Easy Victory; Real Interest in Chapel Hill Game

North Carolina State College will for the first time this season meet an outside team on its own grounds today, playing William and Mary at Riddick Field. But the Virginians are not expected to furnish real opposition and Coach Fetzer will probably save his charges for the struggle with V. P. I. in Norfolk on Armistice Day, when for the fifth time this season the Techs will give battle on foreign soil.

Red and White supporters always seize an opportunity to see the fast going Tech machine in action and the game with the William and Mary aggregation will doubtless draw a good crowd, but the real attraction of the day in these parts is the game at Chapel Hill between the University of North Carolina and the Virginia Military Institute.

The "Flying Squadron" from Lexington have a most pretentious record and on their performance to date deserve rank as the 1920 "Wonder Team" of the South. They have defeated such teams as Virginia, Pennsylvania and North Carolina State, with not a single defeat to mar the glory of their achievements.

On the other hand, Carolina's record to date consists wholly of defeats or unimpressive victories, but Fuller has a splendid opportunity today to wipe out all of the stings of the past with one fell swoop and the Cadets will surely know they have been in a football game, even if they are not ready to stop in their triumphant march.

Another easy contest is on the boards at Wake Forest, the Baptists meeting Elon. Trinity is idle, but up in the air at the hands of State, the Presbyterians have made an impressive record, holding Washington and Lee to two field goals and winning their encounter last Saturday with Richmond. But the Game Cocks have in Metzger, one of the really great veteran coaches of the country and are not a foe to be rated lightly.

UNBEATEN TEAMS FACE EACH OTHER

Today's Battles May Decide Championship; Harvard Plays Princeton

New York, Nov. 5.—Unbeaten eleven will meet in a series of elimination games on several Eastern football fields tomorrow. Results of these battles will go far toward deciding the mythical championship of the section.

Of outstanding interest will be the Harvard-Princeton battle at Cambridge, although the Cornell-Dartmouth, Nebraska-Pennsylvania State, Pittsburgh-Pennsylvania, Georgetown-Navy and Yale-Brown games all have a direct bearing on titular claims at the close of the season.

The contest between Princeton and Harvard, the first of the triangular series of the so-called "big three" will apparently bring together two well matched eleven. The Crimson is expected to present a well drilled and developed football machine, reasonably strong on both offensive and defensive, while the Tigers are reported to have a looser, but more brilliant individual attack and a defense which is far from being invulnerable.

Both elevens may be expected to play with a certain amount of restraint, for each in turn is to meet Yale within the next two weeks and to defeat Yale is considered the crowning glory of the gridiron year, regardless of what has gone before. Harvard rules a favorite in the wagering.

The Dartmouth-Cornell clash offers a more complicated proposition. Cornell, undefeated to date, comes to New York with a comparatively green team of up-uptal power.

On paper, the Harvard combination has the better record, for, in facing Pennsylvania State, Holy Cross and Dartmouth, the team has been out-joined by both Pennsylvania State and Syracuse, the games were extremely close and hard fought.

Brown goes to New Haven to meet Yale with what appears to be an impressive team, yet to taste defeat. In the six games to date, the Providence eleven has run up double figures in every contest. Yale last week won from Colgate, 21 to 7, while two weeks previously Brown defeated the same combination, 14 to 0.

The University of Pittsburgh, another undefeated aggregation, plays Pennsylvania, and while the Panthers' record is slightly marred by a 7 to 7 tie with Syracuse, it would appear as though Glenn Warner's warriors are entirely too powerful for the Quakers. Georgetown will invade Annapolis with its banners showing nothing but victories this season and hopes to repeat last year's defeat of the Navy. The Middies have been slow to round into form this fall and unless there is a marked improvement in the general play of the Navy, Georgetown appears to be justified in believing that it will again triumph over the sailors.

SHAW UNIVERSITY WINS BY FORFEIT

With the score 13 to 0 in favor of Shaw University, yesterday's football game between the local institution and the Virginia Normal and Industrial Institute of Petersburg, was yesterday forfeited to Shaw in the fourth quarter.

The play which caused the Virginia outfit to leave the field and later sever all athletic relations with Shaw occurred about five minutes after the beginning of the final period. Shaw fumbled and a visiting player grabbed the pig skin and rushed for a touchdown. But the officials ruled the play illegal and penalized the V. N. & I. team fifteen yards for holding.

Shaw showed a superior attack throughout the savagely contested game, which was arked by extreme roughness of play on both sides.

GEORGIA-VIRGINIA GAME BIG BATTLE

Georgia, Considered To Have Edge; Other Big Contests Set For South

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 5.—Interest in tomorrow's football program centers in the annual gridiron battle between the Universities of Georgia and Virginia, at Charlottesville, Va.

The Alabama-Vanderbilt annual meeting at Birmingham, usually one of the classics of the season, has had the edge taken off it by the weakness of the Commodores against Georgia Tech and Auburn. The Commodores came back last week against Kentucky State, however, and Alabama supporters expect a victory by a good margin.

Washington and Lee plays the University of West Virginia at Charleston, W. Va., and Virginia Military Institute takes on the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, N. C. Since the Cadets defeated North Carolina State, right after the latter had beaten the Tar Heel eleven, supporters of the Cadets' "flying squadron" expect to win by a healthy margin.

The Georgia-Virginia battle, always a hard-fought contest, is expected to prove that again, but the Georgians record is far more formidable than that of the Virginians, who have placed a rather light eleven in the field for the last two years. The freshmen rule will handicap Georgia to a certain extent.

Auburn battles with Birmingham Southern at Montgomery, Georgia Tech plays Clemson in Atlanta and Tulane takes on the University of Florida at Tampa. Centre College plays De Paul and Mississippi A. and M. meets Mississippi University at Greenwood, Miss.
