

PROPOSE CHANGES FOR SALARY BILL

Senate and House Committees Will Meet On Measure Monday Morning

The Senate Committee on Salaries and Fees yesterday made radical changes in the bill fixing the salaries of all of the Constitutional State Officers except the Governor at \$4,000 each. Supreme Court Judges and Superior Court Judges were included in the bill and the other officers were given a flat increase of \$1,000 each. The action of the Senate Committee will be presented to a joint meeting of the two Houses Monday morning at eleven o'clock and a final draft for presentation to the two Houses will be drawn by the joint committee.

The committee increased the salaries of all judges \$1,000 each. As the bill now stands Justice of the Supreme Court will receive a salary of \$6,000 plus the allowance of \$250.00 and Superior Court Judges will receive a salary of \$5,700, plus an allowance for the actual expenses incident to their office, not to exceed \$1,200. The heads of State Departments will receive the following salaries: Superintendent of Public Instruction, \$5,500; Secretary of State, \$5,000; Treasurer, \$5,000; Attorney General, \$4,800; Auditor, \$4,500.

In order to benefit the State officers who are to be inducted into office next Wednesday, the measure must become a law not later than Tuesday, and it is hoped that a unanimous report will be adopted at the joint meeting Monday.

Due to the shortness of time, it was expected that the House would not support any measure which did not include all of the constitutional officers, as he feared that division into two bills might result in the second measure being defeated.

This view found ready acquiescence and the amendment was adopted unanimously as were the changes in respect to heads of Departments.

The first amendment offered was by Colonel Beshan Cameron, who stated he had encountered considerable opposition to exceeding the recommendations of Governor Bickett, which provided \$5,000 a year. The original bill, introduced by Senator Long, of Alabama, fixed the salaries of each of the officers at \$6,000 and Senator Cameron's amendment reduced each of the salaries to \$5,000. Members of the committee expressed themselves as voting for the reduction on the ground that a recommendation of a larger amount would not be adopted, several of them stating the opinion that the original amount was preferable.

But when Senator Varner suggested that the books be fetched and it was discovered that the Heads of Departments were receiving varying emoluments, it was decided that the equitable thing to do would be to treat all

alike. Those principally affected are State Superintendent Brooks and Auditor Durham. The salary of the Superintendent of Public Instruction has already been raised to \$4,000 a year though the constitutional provision forbidding any increase in an officer's salary during his term of office has prevented the increase from being put into effect.

Dr. Brooks and Major Durham both found champions on the committee, but it was finally agreed that the fairest measure would be to grant both officers the same increase, abiding by the distinction previously made. The Attorney General will also be only \$4,500, but it was pointed out that the Attorney General is not expected to devote his entire time to the duties of his office.

Senator Woodson inquired about an increase in the Governor's salary, but there was no disposition to add to the increase provided four years ago. The Governor now receives a salary of \$4,500 a year and certain allowances, including upkeep of the Mansion.

The House committee on Salaries and Fees has not yet been named but will be announced by Speaker Grier this morning. Representative C. G. Wright, of Guilford, who has been notified that he will head the committee in the lower house was present yesterday at the invitation of Senator W. E. Taylor, chairman of the Senate committee and the two chairmen arranged the joint meeting for Monday.
