

UNIVERSITY WINS COLLEGE DEBATE

Tar Heel Debaters Overwhelm University of Pennsylvania Oratorical Team

Chapel Hill, Jan. 23.—University of North Carolina debaters arguing for the exclusion of immigration for two years, overwhelmed the University of Pennsylvania debaters here last night in Gerard Hall before five hundred students, winning a unanimous decision from the judges and bringing the University's record against Pennsylvania up to six victories to one defeat.

The victory in the first contest of the year put a new life into the University stamp speakers and gives them a good jump off for the heavy winter and spring campaign against Harvard, Hopkins, Washington and Lee, and Cincinnati.

The effective fighting tactics of T. G. Taylor, of Sparta, the big gun of the Tar Heels, backed by the all around program outlined by his colleagues, C. F. Boyd, of Gastonia, and C. P. Boney, of Asheville, was the argument against the hardest like of the Pennsylvaniaans, F. B. Hamilton, M. J. Rabinowitz, C. S. Dow, and H. S. Bettinger, the latter two dividing their time because of the indisposition of Bettinger.

On the ground of the present emergency with many Americans unable to find work and with each immigrant an added mouth to be fed, the Tar Heels fought hard to secure the inclusion of all immigrants for two years. The Pennsylvaniaans refused to recognize the emergency and thought that not so many Europeans were coming to America as in pre-war years.

The judges were Dr. L. H. Wilson, W. M. Woodard, and Prof. Frank Graham, all members of the University faculty. Prof. George McKie presided and William H. Bobbitt, of Charlotte, acted as secretary.

PASTOR CLAIMS PLOT TO OBTAIN CHURCH FUNDS

Preacher Cleared of Police Court Charge Says He's Victim of Hold Up

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 23.—As an aftermath of a police court trial that exonerated him of a charge of insulting Mrs. C. B. Hamilton of this city, Rev. Caleb A. Ridley, pastor of a local church, Sunday morning, from his pulpit virtually charged his accusers with having plotted to make him a victim of a "badger game" for the purpose of obtaining funds which he now claims to hold to meet expenses of a new church erected by his congregation.

When the pastor announced he would attempt to place the principals in the prosecution against him "behind the bars of a prison" he was applauded by the congregation and the meeting was later described as perhaps the most sensational hour's service ever witnessed in an Atlanta church.

Dr. Ridley brought his remarks about the Hamilton case to a close with an appeal for funds to finish the church under construction and within a few moments more than a thousand dollars was subscribed.

The Hamilton-Ridley case has attracted much attention throughout the city and long before the pastor began his sermon this morning the church was crowded with many people being compelled to stand.

LEGISLATOR SPEAKS AT FIRST CHRISTIAN

Prof. W. P. Lawrence Discusses Mission Work of Christian Church

Prof. W. P. Lawrence, member of the General Assembly from Alamance county and professor of English at Elon college, spoke at the evening service of the First Christian church last night instead of the pastor, Rev. J. Vincent Knight. Dr. Lawrence spoke particularly about the mission work of the Christian church in China.

The Southern Christian Convention has undertaken the missionary work in one of the southwestern provinces of China. This province has a total population of about 12,000,000 and the plan of the church is to first establish a school there. The school or college will be known as the "New Elon" in honor of the present Southern college of the Christian church, Elon college, of this State.

The work of the church in this new field, said Dr. Lawrence, should appeal to the young people of the church who are thinking of giving their lives to some form of missionary work. In this province there is need not only for Christian doctors, ministers, and nurses, but for Christian merchants, bankers and other business men as well.

UNIVERSITY AND TRINITY IN LEAD

Other College Admits Have Not Shown Up So Well in Games Played Thus Far

Early season results have clearly shown the University and Trinity in the lead for the State basketball championship. The two teams will clash on Wednesday night in a game that may or may not be decisive.

The contest will take place in Durham and if Trinity wins by a close margin it will merely mean that interest will be transferred to the second game which is scheduled for February 23, at Chapel Hill. However, if Trinity can come through with an overwhelming victory, or if Carolina can surmount the very heavy handicap of playing on the Methodist's own floor, the game will lift the championship practically out of the reach of any other contender.

Other results of last week's play were the virtual elimination of Elon and the demonstration of the fact that both Wake Forest and State must improve much and rapidly unless they are to suffer the same fate.

This week's schedule though not beginning until Wednesday night is a heavy one. Elon makes a four day trip into Virginia, concluding with a game with the University of Virginia Saturday night. Besides its game with Carolina, Trinity has another major contest, meeting Wake Forest in Raleigh Saturday night. Davidson begins its season by playing State and Guilford this week, while State also meets Guilford during the week.

Spent Large Sums of Money. "Considering the reply," Mr. Doughton says, "this contest is informed and believes that large sums of money were contributed by and through State and National organizations" for the aid of the contestee's campaign. Furthermore, that he "was applied with almost unlimited agencies for placing his cause before the people" while the contestee received no financial aid from any organization or individual.

The reply is signed by former Governor Bickett as attorney for the contestee. Representative Doughton is advised that the taking of evidence for Dr. Campbell will begin at Statesville on January 31. In the meantime the runner persists that Campbell may yet quit as he may not induce the Republican Congressional committee to put up the money necessary to guarantee the expenses of the contest, but no verification of such reports is to be had here as yet.

ASKS FOR HIGHER LIVING STANDARD

Judge Daniels Flays Dances and Movies in Charge to Grand Jury

(Fayetteville Observer.)

No better sermon has been preached in Fayetteville in many a day from any pulpit than Judge Frank Daniels' charge to the grand jury upon convening of Cumberland Superior Court this morning and if every person in the county could have heard its delivery and heeded his advice there would be a vast improvement. Preaching the simple teachings of Christ as the standard of living, the able jurist hammered home his thoughts in charging the people to scorn the modern dance halls, keep the boys and girls away from the moving picture houses where they see portrayed on the screen the infidelity of marriage made a joke, where hold-ups are shown, where modern Jesse James and outlaws are impressed upon the youth and he goes out to break into the same hardware stores just like he saw it in the movies; the automobile that leaves trails of evils behind it as young women leave the moving picture houses and spend a big portion of the night riding with a man with no protection, parents who know not where their sons and daughters are after nightfall and seemingly have no care for their protection; and the ministers should stand upon the watchtower, like sentinels and guard the youth against the pitfalls of vice.

Judge Daniels related the fact of how he talked of present-day conditions to a certain minister and asked if he knew about them, and when he said yes, the judge asked the young people about them? Why don't you stand in your pulpit like a sentinel and warn them? and the minister replied he was afraid he would drive them away from him.

For almost an hour Judge Daniels dealt with almost every known form of present-day evils that are tearing down our civilization and crumbling our old-fashioned ideals of purity and morality among the good women of the South. The major portion of his charge dealt with liquor and its various forms of law violation, of how it creeps down through conduct of officers and permeates the dance halls, ruins homes, makes criminals out of highly respected men, brings before the bar of justice those who had led upright lives.

"I am not in favor of law and order leagues, nor the new order of the Ku Klux Klan, nor do I want to see our legislature pass a bill taking authority out of the hands of local officers and creating a police under control of the state in order to enforce prohibition. Create and crystallize public sentiment so that the officers will do their duty and let the people stand behind the officers in the performance of duty. And let public sentiment be so strong that it will rise up and drive out of office those officers who have been associated with moonshiners, who have been hanging around blind tiger joints, who clasp hands with the violators of the law," continued his honor.

No officer can rise any higher than the electorate that puts him in office. The officer who visits blind tigers, frequents red light districts, who drink and gamble are no worse than those who place them in power and keep them there.

But let a fellow, who comes from a good family, who has a large number of friends, be sent to the roads or State Prison and immediately they swarm to my room to intercede and if I decline they then pour into the governor's office asking for clemency. Enforcement of law was stressed by his honor upon the grand jury in such a manner that it greatly impressed the packed court room that heard him. He praised Governor Morrison for including enforcement of law in his inaugural address and asked the people to help see that law is properly enforced.

Judge Daniels has been on the Superior court bench for many years, but it is doubted if he ever delivered a more impressive charge than the one he delivered this morning to the Cumberland county grand jury. He read the report of the Rotary Club in a certain city as immoral conditions and also read different reports from Presbyterian rectors on bad conditions and urged the people to think on these matters and remedy the evils.

Let mothers and fathers get the proper idea of parental duty and let them see that their children are safe at all times. Let them know just where their daughters are when they are out riding in some man's automobile at night. Let them accompany them to the dance and see that there is no indulgence in the wrong form of dances. Let them keep the daughters away from the dance hall where immoral dances, drunkenness and immorality abound.

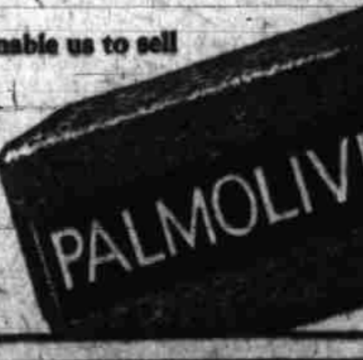
