PASTOR CLAIMS PLOT TO OBTAIN CHURCH FUNDS Preacher Cleared of Police Court Charge Says He's

Victim of Hold Up

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 23.—As an aftermath of a police court trial that exonerated him of a charge of insulting Mrs. C. B. Hamilton of this city, Rev. Caleb A. Ridley, paster of a local church, Sanday morning from his pulpit virtually charged his accusers with having plotted to make him a victim of a "badger game" for the purpose of obtaining funds which he now claims to hold to meet expenses of a new church erected by his congregation.

When the paster announced he would attempt to place the principals in the prosecution against him "behind the bars of a prison" he was applauded the bars of a prison and the meeting

the bars of a prison" he was applauded by the congregation and the meeting was later described as perhaps the most sensetlenal hour's service ever witnessed in an Atlanta church.

Dr. Ridley brought his remarks about the Hamilton case to a close with an appeal for funds to finish the church under construction and within a few moments more than a thousand dollars was subsaribed.

The Hamilton-Ridley case has attractmuch attention throughout the city and long before the master becompelled to stand.
