TWO NEGROES SHOT TO DEATH IDWAY BETWEEN TWO TOWNS

Warrenton, Jan. 24.—With the War-renton "Home Guard" company on duty here to prevent possible clashes between races as a result of the lynching of two negroes taken from the Warren county jail today, everything was quiet here today.

Coroner Jones began early today to impanel a jury for the purpose of con-ducting an inquiry into the negroes

Sheriff Davis, of Warren county, takes this morning that a rigid investi-ration would be made into the lynch-

ration would be made into the lynching. No arrests have been made.

Last hight shortly after midnight a nob estimated from 100 to 150 arrived to the jail. They were masked twakening the negro jailer, the leader stand for the keys to the prison. The allor at first said he did not have hom, but when the mussle of a large allose pistol was placed at his head, a complied with the demand.

About seven men entered the jail and went to the cell in which Planmer Bullock, Alfred Williams and two otherseroes were locked. The door of the

Billock, Alfred Williams and two other negroes were locked. The door of the cels was opened and Williams and Bul-lock were ordered to get up and fol-low them. One of the other negroes began to pray and the leader of the mob socihed him by saying: "We don't want you; we've got the pair we want."

The two negroes, coatless and bare-fected, were led to automobiles in front of the prison and then carried to a point about one mile from the city where they were shot to death. Ap-parently the negroes were given an op-portunity to run and were then shot down. The bodies of Williams and Bul-

wn. The bodies of Williams and Bul lock were found about 20 feet from the lock were found about 20 feet from the public road and about 30 feet apart. Both apparently had tried to escape into a thick wood nearby. The bodies were badly mutilated by bullets. After killing the negroes the mob hastly dispersed in automobiles.

During the early hours of last night, large numbers of negroes callected in

large numbers of negroes collected in groups about the streets of Warrenton. many of whom were armed. Twenty five citizens were deputized as special policemen and the negroes ordered to go to their homes. Reports were in circulation that the negroes would attempt to liberate the prisoners. Five negroes were arrested for carrying firearms, the weapons consisting of one pump gun, two rifles and two shot

While the mob was at the jail, a mulatto negro slipped up to an automobile belonging to one of the party and attempted to set it afire. A volley of bullets sent him scampering down the street, whether hurt or not has not been earned.

STATE PRISON IN RALEIGH Pourteen of the Warren county negrees arrested in connection with the riot Sunday and subsequent develop-ments have been lodged in the State

ments have been lodged in the State Prison. Nine of the negroes were brought over yesterday morning and five others yesterday afternoon. It was first reported that thirteen negroes had been placed under arrest Sanday, but it later developed that only eleven had been taken into custody.

Charlie Smith, one of the nine, told the officers while en routs to Baleigh that Matthew Bullock was the realleader of the negroes. Smith said Bullock came into his presisng club shortly after if o clock Sunday morning, accompanied by about fifteen other negroes, and atated, "We re faxed for the Traylor boys tonight." Smith said the negroes were armed with shotgons and revolvers. He declared that he was relieve when the firing near the railway settlem started. He gave the officers the name of the negroes he said were in the party. Matthew Bullock escaped after in thacting of the Traylor boys and he two militand employs.

Discuss Failure of Germany To Disarm As Provided For By Versailles Treaty

Paris, Jan. 24.—(By The Associated Press.)-The Suprema Council, composed of r presentatives of Great Britain, Italy, France, Belgium and Japan, today heard the military experts, and inter conferred together regarding the failure of Germany to disarm as provided for by the treaty of Versailles. The experts were asked to make a detailed report on the subject with recon mendations regarding measures to insure execution of the disarmment slauses of the trenty. The experts will meet tomorrow morning, while the council will contrary to expectation take up the situation of Austria, in-stead of reparations.

The British Prime Minister, Lloyd George, and the president of the French council, Aristide Briand, it is understood, will take opportunity to talk over the different phases of the reparations questoin before the subject comes up for discussion at the full council. The eventuality of a German being nvited to sit with the council depends partly upon Herr Bergmann's reply to M. Loucheur, who will ask him if Germany has any proposition to make be-fore the allies decide finally on what course they shall pursue to enforce exe-

ution of the treaty.

The premiers are understood to greatly alarmed at the situation of Austria and will endeavor to find some way for the continued existence of that coun-try. The eastern question, Greece and the treaty of Sevres will be taken up after the council h: finished consider-ing the Austrian situation.
