MAN FOUND UNCONSCIOUS ON HIGHWAY NEAR FAYETTEVILLE

Fayetteville, Feb. 5.—Charles Cooper, of San Antonio, Texas, who was found in an unconscious condition on the National Highway three miles north of Fayetteville, in a local hospital. His condition was declared to be improved today. He was found on the road by Deputy Sheriff West and was brought to the county jail here. The man is said to have had a bottle of acid, or some other drug, on his person, and a stomach pump was used both at the jail and after he was taken to the hospital. One of a number of Fayetteville men who have befriended him said today that in his opinion Cooper had not swallowed any of the contents of the bottle, but that he was merely suffering from exhaustion and lack of food, having declared on regaining consciousness that he had not eaten in a long time.

Brinson Favors Federal Aid For State Education

(700,000) could not read and write. Should we not make serious efforts to effect a change in this condition.

"Section 9 provides that three-fourths of the sum shall be used to teach immigrants the English language and to understand the spirit of our government and the duties of American citizenship. This is immensely important, but I find pleasure in the thought that North Carolina will not need its full share of funds under this section.

"Section 12 provides that three-twentieths shall be used to assist states in training their teachers. In this connection it is interesting to note that there are thirty thousand teachers in the United States who haven't been through the eighth grade.

"There is nothing whatever in the contention that the bill invades the rights of the States and assumes dictatorialship in educational matters.

"Section 14 makes absolutely clear the purpose of the law and intent of the men who have proposed it to Congress—Senator Smith, of Georgia, and Representative Tower, of Iowa.

Favorable For State Control.

"This section reads as follows: 'Provided that courses of study, plans and methods for carrying out the purposes and provisions of this act within a State shall be determined by the State and local educational authorities of said State, and this act shall not be construed to require uniformity of courses of study, plans and methods in the sev-

eral States in order to secure the benefits herein provided; and provided further that all the educational facilities encouraged by the provision of this act and accepted by a State shall be organized, supervised and administered exclusively by the legally constituted State and local educational authorities of said State and the secretary of education shall exercise no authority in relation thereto except as herein provided to insure that all funds apportioned to said State shall be used for the purpose for which they are appropriated by Congress.

"For instance, as illustrating the only power of the United States government in this matter, no State will be permitted to use for physical training what the United States appropriates for teaching illiterates.

"I have never felt that the whole burden of the education of the citizens of our country should be borne by the States. The boys and girls of the poor State are just as much citizens of the United States and their possible usefulness to the country is as great as the boys and girls of the rich and prosperous State.

"The hope of a democracy is in the education of its citizens and its first duty then is to educate them.

"The government through the agri-

culural department in spending millions every year to develop a higher type of agriculture and make it more profitable.

"Many put into the brains of our boys and girls will yield the richest returns of any investment the government can make."
