#### CALL ON BAPTISTS TO MEET PLEDGES

Home Mission Board Issues Appeal To Speed Up Col. lections of Money

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 11.—Calling upon the Baptist churches of the South to send in their annual pledges for the 75 Million campaign, which was staged in 1919 to finance the activities of the denomination for the next five years, the Baptist Home Mission Board has issued a statement emphasizing the necessity for speeding up collections in order that the denominational program may be carried forward according to

It is pointed out that in accordance with the greatly extended program as outlined prior to the 75 Million campaign, the Home Board has this year appropriated \$2,000,000 for the main-tenance and expansion of its various departmental activities. This is the largest sum ever appropriated for home mission work by Southern Bap-tists and was made necessary by the need for great setivity in reconstructimes. Last year the appropris tions for home mission work totalled \$1,000,000 or \$900,000 less than the average of \$2,000,000 allotted annually for the five year period. Thus the 1958 appropriation of \$2,000,000, while exceeding the annual average, leaves a margin of \$500,000 unexpended from

work of the Home year is being extended in all departments, but in that of church building and loans fits activity is particularly noteworthy. The sum of \$800,000 has been appropriated for this year's gifts, while the demand for loans has greatly exceeded \$250,000. In order that the church buffding gift and loan department may pursue its activities it is necessary that the Baptist churches of the South meet their pledges without delay, the Home Board points out. #### SUSPEND AND SAVE IN ELECTRICITY, SAYS PROF.

Trinity College, Feb. 11.—"What is the use of buying a new dry-cell battery for your electric bell every three months when by a simple arrangement the ordinary cell will last three years?" asks Dr. C.
