Durham, March 9.—Despite the rain which fell heavily after noon and con-tinued until after 3 o'clock, great throngs of Durham people and visitors from out of the city attended the funeral of George W. Watts, Durham capitalist, who died Monday morning, held at his home on Duke street at 3 p. m. today. Practically every factory and every place of business in Durham closed out of respect to the memory of the deceased and to allow employee

Services began at the home at 3 o'clock promptly. Dr. David H. Scan-lem of the First Presbyterian church read the scripture, Dr. W. W. Moore, of Union Seminary, Richmond, offered the prayer, and De. E. R. Leyburn, of Rome, drive to the cemetery started and Mr. Watts was laid at rest in the family plot in Maplewood cemetery a few minutes later. The services at the grave were simple, Dr. Scalen offering a prayer before the interment.

Crowds surrounded the beautiful resi dence and followed the cortege to the constery. The complety enclosure was filled with people. The floral effering, large and heautiful, completely covered the family plot. Prominent visitors from all sections of the State were in attendance, as well as many from other sections of the country.

President Few, of Trinity college, in Chapel Tuseday morning paid a tribute to the deceased Mr. Watts,

successful and useful men who ever lived in Durham. Through his many busines operations he became a man of large wealth. He was a citizen of Durham and of North Carolina actively interested in every good cause. His generous response to every call during the great war none of us can ever forget. His generosity has been just as abound-ing in the constructive tasks of peace. He takes rank among the greatest He takes rank among the greatest philanthropists of the country.

Attorney General Construes **New Marriage License** Statute

reassured as to their responsibility by ruling from the Attorney General. The biggest burden is placed or county health officers in counties which have whole-time health departments These health officers, under the law are required to make examinations and furnish certificates when asked for, free of charge.

The ruling of the Attorney General made for the benefit of Representative Clem Wright, whose own county of Guilford has been bogged up in uncertainty about the procedure under the

law, follows:

"The act is apparently drawn with full knowledge of our existing marriage law. As does that, it enforces its design by problibition and penalties upon the officers and physicians who are to administer it, and not upon the parties to the marriage contract itself. Any marriage then, which has been olemnized since March 5th, the date on which the Beliamy act was ratified, is perfectly valid, though upon a license issued also since March fith, without the certificates required by the act, Is other words, a marriage when performed by a justice of the peace, or minister of the Gospel is valid though there may be an illegal license, or no license at alf. "The Bellamy act forbids the regis-

Not Insurer of Truth

"It is asked, though, how can the physician certify that the applicant has never been judicially declared of unsound mind? Many cases may be suggested, in which it would be impossible for the applicant to satisfy the certifying physician as to this point beyond eavil or doubt. The certifying physician is not, however, an insurer of the truth of statements in the certificate All the law requires of him is that h should satisfy his judgment in cast particular case, with the individual fea tures insident to it, by the ordinary means accessible to him. He commits no crime unless he wilfully and knowingly makes a false statement, or makes such false statement recklessly with out helief, or any fair and just ground to believe, in its truth. A conscientious physician, and a large majority of them are, applying these general rules, will have little difficulty in dealing

with particular cases."
