

CHAPEL HILL WINS BY SINGLE POINT

Charlotte High School Basketball Team Keeps Score Tied Until The Very Last

Chapel Hill, March 11.—By the margin of one point Chapel Hill won the high school basketball championship of North Carolina, by defeating Charlotte here tonight 33 to 32 in the fastest, closest, most exciting and best all-around high school game seen at the University in many a day.

The two teams stuck to each other in scoring like leeches. Not more than three points were separated them in the first half and two long shots by Yates in the last half minute of play, bringing Charlotte within a single point of Chapel Hill, carried the crowd and teams to fever heat in excitement.

Poor foul shooting haunted heavily in Charlotte's defeat. Harvell and Mallory caged only 10 out of 20 trials and the lost ground here could not be made up by Charlotte's splendid play in other respects. In the all-around play the game took the palm from all the high school contests here this week.

Both teams showed more speed, fought with the utmost keenness and displayed the best brand of high school basketball seen here this year. In the first half they were tied at 3 to 3, at 6 to 6, at 8 to 8, at 10 to 10, at 12 to 12, and in the last few minutes Chapel Hill took the lead 20 to 19. In the second half Chapel Hill always held the lead, running up once to 31 to 24, but Charlotte rallied and under the leadership of Merritt's floor play, speed and shooting stood out for the victors. Poythress shot with accuracy and the guard play and speed of Harvell and Sparrow counted heavily. Chapel Hill was quicker on its feet by a trifle and forced the play most of the time. Harvell was the Charlotte star in the first half in floor play and shooting, fighting desperately against larger opponents and showing great keenness. Mallory played his best game of the week and Yates by his jumping at center gave his team a big advantage.

North Carolina Leads Union In Total Value Tobacco Crop

With a Total of 395,000,000 Pounds Reported Up to March 1 And Enough in Evidence to Bring Year's Total to \$420,000,000 With Average Price of 21 1-2 Cents, State Emerges As Clear Leader of Kentucky.

With a total of 395,000,000 pounds of farmers' sales of tobacco reported to March 1 and enough in evidence to run the year's total up to 420,000,000, averaging 21 1/2 cents, North Carolina emerges as that first State in the Union in total tobacco value, according to Frank Parker, agricultural statistician. The February tobacco sales in North Carolina show a total of 67,491,370 pounds reported, of which 59,216,280 pounds were producers' sales. The average price was \$18.60 as compared with \$18.43 a year ago. The leading markets were respectively Winston-Salem, 11,097,624 at \$19.76; Wilson, 6,193,468 at \$19.48; Greenville, 5,985,749 at \$18.15; and Rocky Mount, 695,896 at \$18.50. There were thirteen times as much sold as in February a year ago.

An unusual feature is that the February sales were the third largest of the season, October being first with 84,597,490 pounds, averaging \$24.20, and November 79,835,468 at \$24.71. The slump in December and January prices evidently affected the marketings. Over ten million pounds more may easily be expected this season. This will give the State a record production of over 420,000,000 pounds at an average selling value of \$21.50, giving the crop an actual value of over \$90,000,000.

North Carolina has grown in tobacco as follows: In 1915 it grew 198,400,000 pounds were producers' sales. The 176,000,000 at 20; 1917, 241,000,000 at 21 1/2; 1918, 310,000,000 at 25; 1919, 325,000,000 at 25; 1920, 395,000,000 at 21 1/2.

RECORD DIVISION OF ESTATE MADE

One Week After Death of Wilson Man, Estate of Quarter Million Divided

Wilson, March 10.—The holdings of the late W. H. Morris has been divided between the four heirs by the committee, appointed by the clerk of Wilson Superior court, Messrs. Ernest Deans, W. D. P. Sharp and R. E. Townsend. Two daughters, one son and one grandson, are the beneficiaries. To Mrs. J. R. Batts goes farm on Wiggins Mill road, consisting of 91 acres, two brick stores on the east side of South Tarboro street, total value \$39,000. To the grandson, Mrs. Gaston Watson was allotted her father's home place on South Tarboro street, four houses and lots in the same locality, one vacant one-acre lot near Park Avenue and one brick store, corner Barnes and Tarboro street, total value, \$34,000. The son, John H. Morris, drew a two hundred acre farm in Taylor's township, a three-acre lot on the east side of Tarboro near Norfolk Southern railroad, and one brick store on west side of South Tarboro street, total value, \$26,000. To the grandson was allotted two brick stores on the west side of South Tarboro street, four brick stores and one vacant lot in Mid-dlesex, total value, \$36,000.

This man's bank and notes left by the deceased was equally divided, making a grand total of \$245,000. This is the quickest settlement of any estate ever made in these parts, owing to the fact that the deceased was indebted to no one. His death occurred on the third of the present month and the settlement was made one week later.
