

INSTALLS OFFICE TO AID SOLDIERS

W. W. Boulineau is in Charge of Vocational Education Board Work

For the benefit of the disabled ex-soldier the Federal Board for Vocational Education has installed offices at 203-204 Law Building to take charge of the work in the eastern half of the State, with Mr. W. W. Boulineau, Jr., local supervisor, in charge. Mr. Boulineau is assisted in his work by Messrs. Frank Capps, C. M. James, James J. Keane, and Mrs. Hannah Fuller, follow-up nurse.

Approximately \$320,000 is being spent in Wake county alone by the Federal Board for Vocational Education during the year 1921, and as much more will be spent as there are disabled soldiers in this territory eligible for Vocational Training under the provisions of the Rehabilitation Act of the Federal Board for Vocational Education. The amount now being spent here represents the cost to the government of training approximately 350 trainees every man in Wake county who received 10 per cent or more disability as a result of his services during the world war is eligible for training. At the present time a special campaign is being waged to get in touch with every man entitled to Vocational Training.

About two dozen trades are represented among the disabled soldiers receiving training on the job here and there is practically no limit to the scope of the trades and professions that may be studied through the Federal Board for Vocational Education with the co-operation of the various industries who are offering splendid support. There are men in almost every university and college in the State, taking classical, scientific, technical, agricultural, medical and various other professional courses.

"While in training," says a statement issued yesterday by Mr. Boulineau, "each man receives a salary that ranges from \$60.00 to \$170.00 per month, in addition to which his tuition or other training expenses are paid by the government. To place a man into suitable Vocational Training, it is absolutely essential to take into consideration his education, disability, previous vocation and general make-up. The Federal Board for Vocational Education has a staff of experts who are qualified in arranging suitable Vocational Training for the disabled ex-soldier and in supervising him in his work leading to a definite job objective. At this juncture, it is of prime importance to mention the splendid co-operation the Red Cross, American Legion and other agencies are rendering the Federal Board in its work to rehabilitate the disabled soldier in order to make him self-sustaining and a useful member to society as he was prior to our entrance into the world war.

REV. DR. H. W. BAYS PASSES AT ROCK HILL

Prominent Methodist Preacher Located For Many Years In Western Carolina

Charlotte, May 3.—Mrs. W. W. Bays and Miss Mamie Bays received a message Monday telling them of the death of Rev. H. W. Bays, D.D., Sunday at midnight, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. G. Stevens, in Rock Hill, S. C. Dr. Bays was the oldest brother of Rev. W. W. Bays, who resided in Charlotte for the greater part of 30 years, prior to his passing away four years ago last autumn.

The two brothers reached the same age, 77 years. They were born in Russell county, Virginia, and began the itinerant ministry of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, together, joining the Holston conference, at Cleveland, Tenn., in October, 1867, and both spent 59 years in the ministry.

Dr. H. W. Bays was for a number of years a member of the Holston conference, then for a short time of the Western North Carolina conference, and for more than 25 years a member of the South Carolina conference. In the last-named conference he was pastor of a number of prominent appointments.

On October 1, 1888, Dr. Bays was married to Miss Fannie Herbert, of Hayesville, N. C., she having passed away

on March 13, 1919. He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. W. G. Stevens, Mrs. W. R. Wilson, Jr., and Mrs. T. A. Moore, of Rock Hill, and Mrs. F. C. Beckman, of Asheville.
