

## TO LET FOURTEEN ROADS NEXT WEEK

Chairman Page Ready To Begin Work On New State System of Roads

More than eighty miles of the State road system approved at last week's session of the State Highway Commission were offered to contractors by Chairman Frank Page yesterday, with bids to be opened in the various district offices beginning next Tuesday. Fourth, Fifth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth district roads are concerned. Mr. Page will leave Monday to be present when the bids are opened.

Fourteen separate projects are included in the batch of advertisements for bids offered yesterday, and among them is every type of road from the gravel to standard concrete. Wilkes and Alleghany get the longest single road, totaling 15.90 miles of water bound macadam road on the link between Elkin and Sparta. McDowell gets the shortest, 1.80 miles of concrete road on the Central highway between Marion and Marion Junction.

Among the roads advertised is the completion of the Durham Chapel Hill highway, the section being 4.10 miles from the Orange county line toward the university. The Durham end of that road is now nearing completion, and the remaining section will be completed as soon as contractors can get to work. It will be standard with concrete construction. Mr. Page hopes to complete it before the beginning of the collegiate year in September.

Lee county, 4.53 miles of gravel road; Orange, 4.10 miles concrete; Moore, 8.75 miles gravel road; Montgomery, 11.97 miles gravel road; Alleghany, 7.90 miles from Sparta to Wilkes county line; Wilkes, 8 miles from Wilkesboro to Alleghany line, both water-bond and macadam; Bridge over Toe river in Yancey county; 4.07 miles penetration macadam in Mitchell; McDowell, 1.80 miles concrete; Rutherford, 9.79 miles gravel on Wilmington-Charlotte-Asheville highway; Cherokee, 7.56 miles gravel; Macon, two projects, 4.77 and 4.97 miles of gravel road; Jackson county, 7.56 miles gravel road. Total, 85.77 miles.

### BUDGET BILL PASSES IN HOUSE; VOTE 344 TO 9

Some Minor Changes Made In Measure As Passed By Senate; Conference

Washington, May 5.—The budget bill was passed today by the House, but with some changes as adopted by the Senate. It now goes to conference. The vote was 344 to 9.

The bill as passed by the Senate provided for creation of a budget bureau in the Treasury Department, with both its director and his assistant to be appointed by the President. The House retained the Senate method of appointing both officials, but voted to make the bureau independent of the Treasury Department.

Provision is made for abolishment of the office of Comptroller of the Treasury and creation in its place of a Comptroller general to be selected by the President. The measure as approved by the Senate, provided for a seven year term for the Comptroller General and made him subject to removal by joint Congressional resolution, which requires the signature of the President. As passed by the House, however, the bill provides for his removal by concurrent resolution, which does not require the President's signature.

In voting the budget bill passed by the last Congress, President Wilson objected to the provision delegating to Congress the power to remove the Comptroller General on the ground that it would be usurpation of executive authority.

## PUSH MOVEMENT FOR NEW BUILDING

Board of Agriculture Finds Blind School Buildings Inadequate

The State Board of Agriculture, concluding its session here yesterday, slashed \$20,000 from the budget of the State Department of Agriculture and decided that the plant of the State School for the Blind soon to be abandoned of Raleigh, is not suitable for a home for the department of agriculture.

At a conference with Governor Morrison yesterday morning, Governor Morrison suggested that it might be advisable for the State at this time to house the department of agriculture in the buildings of the State School for the Blind. The Board of Agriculture yesterday afternoon visited the School for the Blind, made a careful inspection of the property and returned for a second conference with the Governor convinced that the buildings there are not suitable for the department.

Today, in the event that Attorney General J. S. Manning returns to the city, the building committee of the Board of Agriculture will meet with the council of state relative to finances for the new building.

The building committee of the State Board of Agriculture is composed of R. W. Scott, chairman, A. T. McCallum, R. L. Woodard, Dr. Clarence Poe and F. P. Latham.

The reduction in the budget of the board for the next six months was made necessary by the falling off of revenue usually coming in from fertilizer sales. This was reduced this year approximately 50 per cent.

## Ultimatum Calls For Answer From Germany May 12

ly and 25 per cent of the amount of her exports.

Within 25 days the reparations commission shall establish a special sub-commission to be called the committee on guarantees, to consist of representatives of the Allied powers, including a representative of the United States in the event of that government desiring to make an appointment. This committee shall comprise not more than three representatives from the nationalities of other powers when it shall appear that a sufficient portion of the bonds are held by nationals of such powers as to justify their representation.

Duties of Committee

This committee will supervise the application to the bonds service of the funds assigned as security for payment, such as German maritime and land customs duties, and in particular all import and export duties, the levy of 26 per cent on the German exports and the proceeds of such direct and indirect taxes or any other funds as may be proposed by the German government and accepted by the committee in substitution thereof.

The 26 per cent levy on exports, less one per cent for sinking fund, it is provided shall be paid by the German government to the exporter.

The committee is not authorized to interfere with the German administration.

As to Reconstruction

Germany, it is stipulated, shall, subject to the prior approval of the commission, provide such material and labor as any allied power may require for the restoration of the devastated areas of that power or to enable any allied power to proceed with the restoration and development of its industrial and economic life. The value of such material and labor shall be determined by German and allied valuers.

## BEAMAN TO ATTEND RATE HEARING IN WASHINGTON

M. R. Beaman, secretary of the Raleigh Chamber of Commerce left last night for Washington where he will appear as a witness for North Carolina shippers in opposition to the petition of railroads for an increase in minimum charges on all freight below first class to first class rates.

Mr. Beaman will also endeavor to get a decision on the North Carolina rate case which was decided in favor of North Carolina shippers last May, but on which the railroads were given a rehearing last September.
