DANIELS SPEAKS

Delivers Strong Address in Behalf of Christian Education Movement

Becky Mount, May 16.-What the in abundance. world needs is an application and vision of the spirit of Wesley when he declared "The world is my parish." Hon. Josephus Daniels, former Secre-tary of the Navy and editor of the News and Observer told an audience that packed the auditorium and Sanchurch last night. Mr. Daniels was speaking in the interest of the Chris-tian Education Movement which the Southern Methodist church is waging He stressed the need of the world for Christian leadership such as is turned out by the church schools and institu

Mr. Daniels began his address with Church was born in a college, and he traced briefly the career of John and Charles Wesley at Oxford . "There is ne cloister in religion,' the speaker declared, "and any religion that does not send its followers out to serve and aid mankind is a mere hot hence plant. Wesley and his fellows turned from the classic shades of Oxford to the mines and factories where they took the story of salvation to the murky grimy workers. They were fired with a passion for saving souls, and the miners and factory workers heard them with open hearts.

Wesley's Example. Wesley's example is the great need in this day of ours. The old South, of which we know, produced great men, but individualism and strength of family predominated. We had never learned the value of co-operation by which communities may unite to work It was up to our generation to add the needed team-work so that we might build greater imptitutions and accomplish greater and mobiler things. Wesley's expression, 'The World is my parish,' is most applicable to present times. What a rebuke is it to those people who think only of themselves who love only their ewn country, and who cannot see beyond the confines of our own nation and across the sea.

"The world is not in chaos," Mr. Danels continued," but it is stumbling and drifting and needs the feeling on the part of every man that his duty is to the world and cannot be performed by a less conception that Wesley had

"What we need," the speaker declar," is leadership that leads, leader ship that is guided by the wisdom an light of the Almighty God. Mr. Wesley had such a conception and his advice and counsel comes to us now. The Methodist Church, therefore, must educate and Christianize and provide such type of leadership'. Mr. Daniels showed the great need for more ministers and massionaries and the adequate fac-ilities. The women of the world must be reached, he declared, the congestion of the crowded colleges relieved and Christian teachers paid .adequate sal aries for their life work.

The speaker refuted the argument that this was not the proper time for the staging of such a campaign, declaring that in the time of prosperity when the world is out joy-riding it loses sight of the spiritual and moral things in its quest of the material. During times of plenty there is no serious thought of the future, but now the young people are taking steps to pre-pare themselves for life and to remove th obstacles which they know face them The leadership of the world must be trained within the next few years to realize that faith in God and service for Him furnish the only light that will


