

DANIELS SPEAKS AT ROCKY MOUNT

Delivers Strong Address in Behalf of Christian Education Movement
Rocky Mount, May 16.—What the world needs is an application and vision of the spirit of Wesley when he declared "The world is my parish."

Wesley's Example. "Wesley's example is the great need in this day of ours. The old South, of which we know, produced great men, but individualism and strength of family predominated. We had never learned the value of co-operation by which communities may unite to work miracles. It was up to our generation to add the needed teamwork so that we might build greater institutions and accomplish greater and nobler things."

Need of Leadership. "What we need," the speaker declared, "is leadership that leads, leadership that is guided by the wisdom and light of the Almighty God. Mr. Wesley had such a conception and his advice and counsel comes to us now. The Methodist Church, therefore, must educate and Christianize and provide such type of leadership." Mr. Daniels showed the great need for more ministers and missionaries and the adequate facilities. The women of the world must be reached, he declared, the congestion of the crowded colleges relieved and Christian teachers paid adequate salaries for their life work.
