

### ENDORSE FARMERS' MARKET PROGRAM

#### Business and Professional Men Perfect Organization To Promote Project

Business and professional men representing all sections of the State were in session here today, to perfect an organization to promote the project.

E. B. Crow, of Raleigh, presided and introduced Dr. R. W. Kilgore, who explained the meaning of the co-operative movement which is now sweeping the South. He told how growers and business men had prospered through co-operative marketing in California where the same principles of business organization as contained in the present North Carolina associations, were first applied 25 years ago. In contrasting conditions in California and North Carolina Dr. Kilgore stated that there is today a gap of a generation between North Carolina farms and towns. Because farmers are prosperous in California land values are high and the State is able to raise enough taxes to build concrete roads and schools and churches.

"If we do not get a fair price for agricultural products we can't build any good roads, schools or churches," L. S. Tomlinson, of Wilson, told the business men. "It takes money to build roads and make improvements in a State like North Carolina all money comes from agriculture." Mr. Tomlinson said he was for co-operative marketing because it was a community proposition and not just a farmers' problem.

The business and professional men perfected an organization and elected the following officers: F. R. McKinnis, Louisville, president; H. F. Pearce, Warsaw, first vice president; A. W. Seain, secretary; and E. B. Crow, L. S. Tomlinson and Clarence Poe members of the executive committee. These men were instructed to appoint a large committee of leading business and professional men to serve in their own district in pushing the campaign for the co-operative marketing of cotton and tobacco. This committee announces that the big committee to cover the State will be ready within the next few days. The following resolution was passed by the men present at the meeting in the capital:

"Resolved, That this conference of business men approve co-operative marketing as a means that has been successful elsewhere where tried for years in marketing more intelligently and profitably agricultural products and increasing agricultural prosperity and the prosperity of all other lines of business in agricultural States like North Carolina, and pledge our support to the movement for co-operative marketing of cotton and tobacco in this State."

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF LUTHERANS TO MEET

Mooresville, July 6.—A call has been sent out by President J. L. Morgan for a meeting of the executive committee of the United Lutheran Church of North Carolina, to be held in his office at Salisbury on July 7th.

The executive committee is composed of the officers of the synod with three additional ministers and three laymen. This will be the first meeting of the committee since the merging of the two Lutheran synods of North Carolina. By the uniting of these two synods there is brought together about forty thousand members of this denomination in the State.

One of the important problems to be presented for discussion and solution at the Salisbury meeting will be that of home missions. The two synods are carrying on an extensive mission program in the State. Another question for discussion will be that relating to the three educational institutions now maintained by the synod.

### BAPTISTS LAUNCH DRIVE FOR SOULS

#### Rev. A. C. Hamby Holds Conference at Sanford; Organization is Underway

Sanford, July 6.—Rev. A. C. Hamby, new enlistment secretary of the Baptist State Board of Missions, held a conference in the First Baptist church of this place Tuesday in the interest of the "Every One Win One" campaign. About one-half of the 53 churches in the Sandy Creek Association were represented at this conference by pastors and leading laymen.

The "Every One Win One" movement was launched at the recent meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Chattanooga. Dr. Chas. E. Maddy, corresponding secretary of the Board of Missions, is now busy organizing the 66 associations in the State for the big campaign, which is to be put over from September 19 to October 10. Every Baptist church in the State is urged to hold evangelistic meetings, if practical, before that time, and this period will be devoted to a general round-up of all the available resources of each church.

The campaign is to be of the same magnitude as the 75-Million Campaign, and it will perhaps be more difficult, for it is more important. Each church in the Southern Baptist Convention is asked to put on an intensive soul-winning campaign, and each member is urged to try to win another one. The goal is the winning of two and a half million souls within the five-year period covered by the 75-Million Campaign.

All the pastors and laymen present yesterday pledged themselves to enter the campaign heartily and do every thing within their power to get their churches to get in action in the campaign. Dr. Hamby made a fine impression on the pastors here. This was his second conference. He went from here to Hamlet for a conference today. Dr. Maddy is in the eastern part of the State holding similar conferences. Rev. Walter M. Gilmore, of Sanford, has been made director of the campaign in the Sandy Creek Association.

### STATE'S FARMERS WANT PICRIC ACID

#### High Explosive Needed in Clearing Farm Lands; Rates on Melons Not Too High

Washington, July 6.—There comes a call from N. C. for picric acid for use in clearing farm lands. Taking action following a letter from J. R. Herring, of Bufoeville, Congressman Lyon, took up the matter of obtaining picric acid from the Bureau of Public Roads. From Director McDonald he obtained the information that there were about 12,500,000 pounds of it at Sparta, Wisconsin, and Fort Wingate, New Mexico, that this must be carted and prepared for shipment before anything could be done, that a more powerful cap than that used for dynamite must be used. The bureau is now formulating plans to have the acid sent out.

the preparation and freight charges to be paid for by the user. Congressman Ward is also receiving letters about the matter, and learns that picric acid will cost 12 cents a pound. Early action is hoped for in obtaining it for use, and Mr. Ward says he is taking up the matter of having shipments made in bulk to North Carolina, as this will be the cheapest way.

To Furnish Bond. The commanding general at Camp Bragg, North Carolina, has advised Senator Simmons that he will furnish the Camp Bragg military band to the local post of the American Legion, Rocky Mount, for the great American Legion celebration which will be held at Rocky Mount on July 14th.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is of the opinion that North Carolina shippers of cantaloupes and watermelons receive reasonable returns for their shipments to northern points under the existing rates, and so states in a letter to Senator Simmons. It says that California cantaloupes, Georgia and Florida melons, with a higher rate

of freight, that of California three times as great, Georgia and Florida two times as great as the rates from North Carolina, are being sold at gratifying figures, that the season is proving a most successful one, and that if it costs even more in North Carolina to produce watermelons, as much as 25 per cent greater than the cost in Georgia, that there would be a margin of over 200 per cent for North Carolina shippers after paying the present freight rates.
