

## SMITHFIELD MAN BADLY BEATEN UP

Tobacco Warehouseman Victim of Assault by Three Tenants On His Farm

Smithfield, Aug. 2.—Will H. Lassiter, of this city, was knocked down, beat up, robbed and left in a field in an unconscious condition by a man named Benson and his two sons, who reside on Mr. Lassiter's place about eight miles from this place. Mr. Lassiter was brought to town and is resting comfortably after receiving medical attention.

Many stories are current in regard to the affair, but it seems that Mr. Lassiter, who is a tobacco warehouseman, had driven out by his place with no intention of stopping as he had had trouble with his tenants in trying to get them off his place and upon seeing the elder Benson sitting by the road side Mr. Lassiter stopped his automobile for a friendly chat with the old gentleman who seemed in the best of humor.

After a short conversation, Mr. Lassiter stated that he must hurry on, whereupon the old man is reported as stating that he wished to go down the road but wanted to wait for his boys.

Mr. Lassiter waited for them to come and went into the garden where he was picking tomatoes when one of the young men arrived with a rod in his hand. It is alleged that the three men after knocking Mr. Lassiter down turned on him and beat him up.

They ran away, it is declared, and left him to be picked up by a passerby. The elder Benson is said to be a man of good reputation but his boys are declared to be reckless and to have caused trouble before. No arrests have been made.

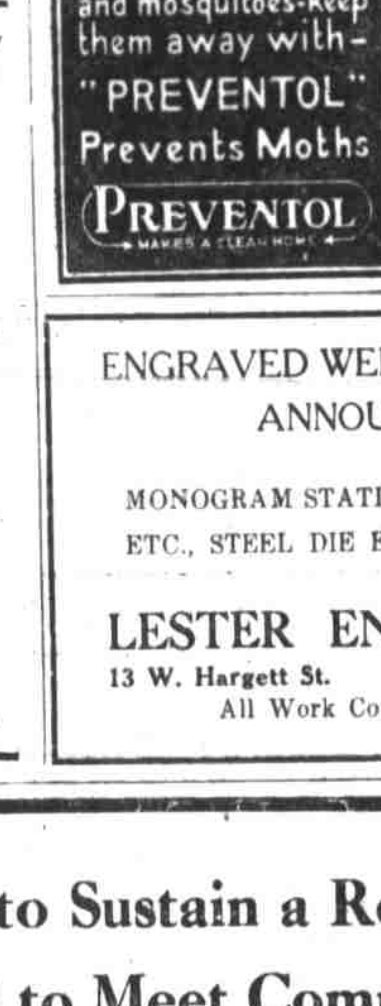
