Se anxious was he to get in that he offered Colonel Pogue \$500 to offer the man who already has the space to give it up. It couldn't be dove.

It happens that way all day long now Colonel Pogue declares, and the only peace of mind that he gets is in the hope that next year there will be bigger and more buildings to house the impor tunate would-be exhibitors and their New buildings are absolutely wares. essential, he says.

Thirteen counties have made reservation for county wide exhibits arranged through their form and home demonstration agents, double the number that have ever been offered here before. Large individual exhibits take more space than ever in history, and the number of large manufacturers have mulitplied ten fold. More than a thou and entire are booked for appearance And Colonel Pogue believes that 100. 000 visitors will be here to see all this for themselves.

The influence of Mrs. George W. Van derbilt, president of the Fair, through out the western part of the State, has been very noticeable this year in the extent and number of exhibits that are coming down from the mountains. 
