

# TEXTILE SHOW AT GREENVILLE OPENS

## Head of Canadian Garment Manufacturers Makes Address; Many Exhibits

Greenville, S. C., Oct. 6.—Emphasis was laid upon the community of interests between Canada and the United States by R. P. Sparks, president of the Canadian Garment Manufacturers' Association, in an address at the opening of the Textile Products Show here today. Mr. Sparks gave figures to show that Canada was Uncle Sam's best customer but said trade had been greatly curtailed by the emergency tariff act. James D. Hammett, president of the South Carolina Cotton Manufacturers' Association, declared that many statements have been made regarding the textile operatives and employers that are "cruel and unjust" and asserted that the textile manufacturers of the South and the nation court the fullest investigation regarding conditions surrounding the operation of the mills. The cotton mill communities of the South, he said, are equal to any other community in the country, in point of morals and moral life.

Exhibits representing a great variety of cotton cloths were in place when the show opened and hundreds of visitors, many of them prominent in the textile industry, were here for the opening. Many of them were guests at a joint luncheon of the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs and at a reception at the Pointsett Club.

"The Open Price Plan" as worked out by the Knit Goods Association of America, was explained by its secretary, Roy Cheney, to members of the South Carolina Cotton Manufacturers' Association at their annual meeting here today. Such a plan, which permits members of an association to keep in touch with prices of other members, was considered by the cotton manufacturers, but the details of the discussion were not made public. It was announced that the plan probably would be considered by a representative committee at a later meeting.

Officers were re-elected as follows: Mr. Hammett, president; A. F. McKisick, Greenville, vice-president; and Robert W. Sullivan, Anderson, secretary-treasurer. The members of the executive committee elected at today's meeting are:

J. C. Pionk, Hickory, N. C.; T. M. Marchant, Greenville; P. Woodside, Greenville; R. E. Ligon, Anderson; Leroy Springs, Lancaster; and James A. Chapman, Spartanburg.

Resolutions were adopted advocating passage of the Smoot sales tax bill and the passage of an adequate tariff measure.

### COUPLE BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN ASPHYXIATED

#### Husband and Wife Found Dead In Bathroom of Home in Jacksonville

Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 6.—The bodies of Anatole Valcourt, 27, and his wife, aged 22, members of well-known local families, were found in the bathroom of their home here this afternoon. A physician who was called stated that he believed the couple had died as a result of inhaling gas fumes from the hot water heater. Officials who investigated the case expressed the belief that the deaths had been accidental. A coroner's jury, it was said, will hold an inquest tomorrow.

Mrs. Valcourt was found in the bathtub partly filled with water, while her husband lay, partly clad, alongside the tub with a noose on the neck of his head, apparently received when he fell to the floor. The theory was advanced that his wife had been overcome by gas fumes and that Valcourt in going to her assistance also had been struck.

# AVERTS SPLIT IN RANKS OF BANKERS

## Conflict Between National and State Bank Division; McAdams President

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—A threatened split in the ranks of the American Bankers' Association was averted today by announcement that the executive council of the organization had reversed an earlier decision favoring establishment of branches by national banks, under certain conditions.

The announcement was made by John S. Drum, president, in today's general session of the association's convention. Mr. Drum made the motion in the council which resulted in the reversal. He said there was "unalterable conflict" between national and state banks division of the association on the subject.

In the State bank division earlier in the week changes that the largest national banks were assuming "octopus" tactics were made and speakers declared the extension of national bank branches would wipe out the smaller State banks.

Another attack on extension of the government postal savings bank system was launched today. A. E. Adams, of Youngstown, Ohio, a former association president, declared any such extension would only increase government expenses without giving the public any thing of value.

The National bank division adopted a resolution requesting Congress to amend the National Bank act so as to permit National banks to operate branches within the corporate limits in which the head office of the bank is located and that this be limited to States in which State chartered banks are permitted to operate branches.

Thomas R. McAdams, of Richmond, Va., first vice president, today was unanimously elected president of the association.

### BELIEVED THEY WERE MARRIED BUT WERE

#### Craven Couple In Embarrassing Situation Because Magistrate Not Qualified

New Bern, Oct. 6.—Consequences of more or less serious nature may be the lot of B. B. Wooten, of Fort Barnwell as a result of the discovery several days ago that his commission as a justice of the peace had expired nearly a month before he went through the ceremony of marrying Mr. Paul R. House, of Fort Barnwell, and Miss Edie J. House of Dover, making it necessary for them five months later, to secure another license and to be legally married.

Mr. Ernest House, father of the groom, was in New Bern yesterday looking into the situation, and it was very evident that he was far from pleased with the hour that Mr. Wooten had staged. What statement the latter has to make is not known, but the indications are that he will be called on to make one within a few days.

License for the marriage was secured from the local office on April 26th, and the couple married, at all intent, by Mr. Wooten the following day. The couple set up housekeeping at Fort Barnwell never dreaming that in the eyes of the law they were not man and wife. Not until a few days ago was the embarrassing discovery made.

Sometime during the week Mr. J. R. Jolly of Fort Barnwell, took a paper to the court to have it probated. It bore the seal and name of Mr. Wooten. It was then that the clerk of the court found the error. His commission had expired during March, hence his work was invalid. Advice of Clerk Lancaster's findings soon reached Mr. House, and to his chagrin, he found his own marriage null.

The second license was issued yesterday and again the couple went through the ceremony, this time entirely legal. But the case does not stand settled, it is believed. In the first place Mr. Wooten has never returned the first license, according to Mrs. G. A. Farrow, Register of Deeds, in the second place, he is held responsible by the parents of the couple of least, with having placed them in an embarrassing situation.

### Franchise Tax Enjoined.

The agreement reached means, according to counsel, that until the case is finally decided the State will not be able to collect taxes on a total valuation of more than \$54,000,000 from the railroads. The difference between the State assessment of the Southern and the temporary valuation is \$36,000,000; the Atlantic Coast Line about \$16,000,000, and the Atlantic and Yadkin in round numbers \$2,000,000. Then the franchise tax is not to be collected until after the final decision of the court as to the constitutionality of the law creating the franchise tax.

There was but little arguing in the hearing both sides contenting themselves with figures and brief talks. For the State Attorney General James S. Manning was in the lead, assisted by Judges W. P. Bynum and George H. Brown. For the railroads, E. R. Pricco and A. B. Andrews represented the Southern interests, while Thomas W. Davis was on hand for the Atlantic Coast Line.

So far as any definite action is concerned counsel for both sides agree that nothing will be done until next year.

### Doughton Can Serve

Representative E. A. Doughton and Representative J. C. McLee, both now serving as members of the State Highway Commission, will return to their places in the General Assembly. Question raised to their eligibility on account of their service on the Commission is answered by the Governor with the declaration that their appointment is not a place of profit, as contemplated by the constitution, but service in a special board, and not unlike membership of the Board of Trustees of any State institution.

Neither has resigned his seat, and it is understood that neither will resign. While no formal opinion has been handed down by the Attorney General, it is understood that he is of the opinion that no constitutional barrier stands between either man and any desire he may have to sit in the General Assembly until his term expires.

### Law Not Mandatory

Nothing mandatory has been found in the statutes covering the election of members of the General Assembly to fill vacancies. The law sets out the machinery for holding the election, but does not make it obligatory upon election officials to call the election.  
Wake county authorities are not at all enthusiastic about having an election. It will be costly, requiring as much expenditure as a regular election with candidates for everything from constable to president. No machinery is provided for holding primaries, and it is held that anybody who wants to run may run, and the high man will be declared the winner. The election will cost about \$1000.

Wake county has one vowed candidate for Mr. Mumford's mantle in J. Sherman Upchurch, and others are expected in the event the election is actually called. There have been rumors current for weeks that Wake county would send up a woman in the event that somebody had to go, and the names of several prominent women have been mentioned for the place.

### Simmons to Front Again.

The tax bill was to the fore again today and again it was necessary for Senator Simmons to take the floor to clear away the smoke screen the Republicans were endeavoring to throw about the surrender, and he laid down some further propositions, enlarging also on the argument he made last week. In his remarks he showed that Senator Penrose, Republican chairman of the finance committee, had been driven to admit and confess that the pending bill is only to be regarded as a temporary measure and that a further revision must shortly take place while here before the Republicans have contended they were enacting the permanent tax bill. The bill he offered, however, has been filled so full of holes that he has found it necessary to explain that it is to be a temporary bill any way. Senator Simmons stripped off the mask from the subterfuge and the deceptions the Republicans are attempting to use to explain their absolute change of front in the opening remarks in his speech today, these being:

"Mr. President, I do not rise to make a speech, but simply to read a very brief statement. Before doing so, however, I wish to say that in the framing of this bill by the finance committee I never heard any suggestion that the bill we were framing was an emergency measure or a temporary measure; on the contrary, I understood from every thing that was said that the majority claimed that they were preparing a permanent revenue system upon a scientific basis. When, therefore, the chairman of the committee, the Senator from Pennsylvania, on yesterday morning gave out his statement to the effect that this bill was a temporary measure and that in a very brief period of time we were to have another revision of the revenue law, the statement was made in contradiction of all the understandings that we had during the framing of the pending measure and was not made until it had been shot to pieces on the floor of the Senate. It must be accepted, therefore, as an apology on the part of the Senator from Pennsylvania on the one hand for bringing in the bill now before the Senate and on the other hand as an admission of its imperfection."

this nation would not only be retarded but suspended and that a measure of that character comprehended no wholesome economy. In his remarks he announced his purpose to suggest amendments in the nature of substitutes for many important provisions of the revenue bill as reported by the committee on finance. I shall not attempt to review in detail the suggestions made by the Senator from North Carolina and those who supported him in his proposals, but the comprehensive material increase in the surtax in large incomes, the continuance of the excess profits tax, or the substitution of other taxes for them, including the present tax on the

capital stock of corporations and the reduction of miscellaneous taxes. It will be insisted among other things in the minority report that the tax on transportation ought to be repealed to become effective the first of January next and that the present tax on the capital stock of corporations should be retained.
