Subsequently, Senator Knox was the author of a resolution adopted by the stories being false from start to Senate in May, 1920, declaring peace with Germany. This also was vetoed by President Wilson.

Senator Knox first came into nationa rominence when in 1901 President Mc Kinley appointed him as attorney gen ral. He retained that office under President Roosevelt until 1904 when he resigned to accept an appointment as United States Senator from Pennsyl rania to succeed the late Senator Quas As attorney general he established record for presecutions of trusts and

Soon after Mr. Knox instituted proceedings against 14 railroad corporations charging them with being in dombination in restraint of trade and fin-ally won all the suits. His friends de clare that he was a pioneer in the movement to control corporations.
