

CITY RECOGNIZES TWO PRINT LABELS

Union Shops To Use Their Device While Open Shops Will Have Their Own

With the proprietors of open shops and representatives of union leaders both present in force, the City Commissioners yesterday by a vote of two to one refused to reconsider their action in repealing the old ordinance, passed under the aldermanic system of government, which required that all printing done for the city of Raleigh bear the label of Raleigh Typographical Union, No. 54.

Commissioner Mooneyhan made a motion for reconsideration of the vote by which the repealing ordinance was passed but that motion was promptly tabled by the votes of Mayor Eldridge and Commissioner Bray. Mr. Mooneyhan then introduced an ordinance to the effect that the union label be required, with a proviso the ordinance should not be considered as preventing the letting of contracts to the lowest bidder. This ordinance was lost through failure of a second.

Following a somewhat bitter discussion, Mayor Eldridge offered a resolution providing that the city's printing should be given to the shops offering the best terms, material and workmanship considered that union shops should have the privilege of placing the union label on their output and that open shops can mark their work with some suitable label. This resolution was with objection from the quarters of the open shopmen.

Adoption of the resolution was opposed by discussion by both parties to the controversy, attorneys F. W. Hooker and Murray Allen speaking for the proprietors of the four open shops in the city, all of whom were represented by C. F. Koonce, R. W. Harrington, James E. Collins speaking for a delegation of eight or ten union printers.

The printers pleaded for the retention of the old ordinance, but conceded the right of the city to let its printing contracts to the lowest bidder. The delegation stressed the fact that members of the union are citizens of Raleigh while a number of the proprietors of the open shops are non-residents of Raleigh.

In the principal speech for the union printers, Ex-Governor Hargett denounced the old ordinance as unconstitutional and obtained the right of the commissioners to meet such legislation. He also called attention to the fact that at the time of its passage competing shops in Raleigh were not allowed a union label.

In concluding his remarks, Mayor Eldridge submitted a statement regarding the union label of political organizations to union labor on the part of the city's commissioners, which was read in a petition filed in behalf

of the printing unions last Friday. Permission was sought later to withdraw the petition and substitute another but the unions did not avail themselves of the privilege and the original petition was incorporated in the record yesterday.

Mayor Eldridge's statement follows: "In view of the suggestion contained in the petition of the allied printing crafts that the mayor and commissioners were elected by union labor votes and could not have been elected without such support, it must be understood that the imputation that my attitude in regard to any public matter can be influenced by representations as to political services performed or promised, cannot be permitted to pass unnoticed. In my public administration I intend to serve the welfare of the community to the best of my ability with a conscience clear of influences brought to bear by friends or enemies. I appreciate fully the good offices of my friends and on proper occasions and in proper ways am happy to reciprocate favors, but the thought that I can be expected to pay political debts by the sacrifice of the interests of the public or of any private interest that may be affected by my official action must be repudiated."

EDGEcombe WILL BUY HALF MILLION IN BONDS

Tarboro, Oct. 17. Edgecombe county board of commissioners met here today and unanimously agreed that the county would raise five hundred thousand dollars, not to exceed five per cent, and purchase five hundred thousand dollars North Carolina State bonds for the purpose of building hard surface road from Rocky Mount through Tarboro and on to Pitt county line.

MRS. MODELLE MCGINNIS TO BE BURIED TODAY
