1921 TAX BOOKS

Returns Now Inadequate.

Tax rates worked out by county off. cers on the basis of the earlier values certified down to the counties will now prove inadequate to the requirements of county governments. Further confusion is expected when the final decision of the courts settles the question for those now being banded down.

The new values were determined by agreement of State and railroad coun-sel for the State to accept payment of that part of the taxes due on basis of the complaint of the railroads. Values have been reduced 31 per cent, and the remainder certified. Taxes will be paid on that basis, and the ques-tion of paying the remainder left to the courts for final settlement.
